Howard A. Hobson, former University of Oregon star, and late coach at Benson Tech of Portland, arrived yesterday to assume his duties as coach at the Southern Oregon Normal at Ashland.

Just 13 lettersmen will greet the new coach when the opening practice session gets under way Thursday. There will be many new faces, drawn to Southern Oregon by the personality of Hobson.

Buel Beckham and Curt Beckham, two boys from Bend, will report. Beckham is a 140-pound halfback and is a fast, snifty and outstanding safety player.

WIN TODAY GIVES YANKEES PENNANT; CUBS MAULED, 4-3

(By The Associated Press) The opposition willing, today promised to bring the end of the long, dusty trail Manager Joe McCarthy and his Yankees have trod on the way to Pennantville.

A victory over the Cleveland Indians today and the Yanks are "in." Or, falling that, the Ruppert Rifles can lose and still sew up the American league flag, providing the Athletics and Senators also are taken for a couple of falls.

The Yanks assured themselves at least a tie by yesterday's 12-inning triumph over Cleveland, 8 to 3. They scored five times after two were out in the last inning.

Washington scored its ninth consecutive victory, defeating Chicago, 9 to 3, with Alvin Crowder pitching.

Lefty Grove was in fine fettle and the Athletics thumped Detroit, 7 to 1. It was his 23rd victory.

The Brooklyn Dodgers gave no aid and comfort to the Cubs' cause in the National league when they beat the leaders, 4 to 3. The setback reduced Chicago's lead to five games over the Pittsburgh Pirates, who were trimming the Phillies, 4 to 2, in the league's only other engagement.

A triple from the bat of Ben Chapman and a home run by Bill Dickey were the deciding blows in the 12-inning Cleveland-Yankees game, Chapman's hit clearing loaded sacks and Dickey's round trip blow sending Ben home ahead of him for the five runs that sank the Indians.

If the Yankees do close the books today their manager will become the first man to pilot a pennant winner in each major league. His previous success was with the Chicago Cubs, whom he now stands a good chance of meeting in the world series.

The Cubs' downfall may be laid to Johnny Frederick, who retired from strenuous competition this year to sit on the bench and every now and then hit a home run when Manager Max Carey asked him to. It was the last half of the nine, Glenn Wright was on base, the Cubs were a run ahead, so he snaked one of Burleigh Grimes' offerings against the right field screen to settle the argument.

Paul Warner's home run in the first inning with his brother, Lloyd, on base, helped the Pirates make a clean sweep of their three-game series with the Phillies.

PRESIDENT FRAMES ECONOMY CHANGE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—(AP)—President Hoover announced today he had ordered the director of the budget to initiate investigations looking toward a complete reorganization of the entire structure of the executive branch of the government.

The president, acting under the authority granted him by the national economy act, said executive orders recommending a wholesale reorganization of the government would be prepared by the time congress convenes in December.

Under the economy act, executive orders recommending such changes in the structure of the government must be before congress for sixty days. If not disapproved within that time they become effective.

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WHITE FLOORED 3 TIMES, GETS DRAW IN KLAMATH RING

Herb White and Jack Gibbs, Medford's hard hitting main eventers on Wednesday night's fight card at the Armory, stole all honors in the Klamath Falls ring last night, where they met tough opponents.

Jack Gibbs scored a clean knockout over Jack Young, highly touted Reno fighter, in the second round after having Young down for coups in the first round.

Herb White, the dynamic little Butte Falls slugger, put up the greatest fight ever staged in a Klamath Falls ring, his opponent, Ernie Bailey, veteran Aberdeen fighter, was down for counts four times, once in each round. Bailey knocked Herb down three times in the first round, but Herb weathered the storm like a seasoned veteran and nearly scored a knockout in each succeeding round, but the Aberdeen boy's ring generalship saved him from a knockout just when Herb would have him reeling and bewildered.

Bailey is fighting a six-round fight in Portland Friday.

White is "made" in Klamath Falls and has been asked to fight on their next fight card there, the 22nd.

It appears to be a serious question this year whether Francis Outmet can muster the strength to withstand the fresh charge of America's golfing youth in the forthcoming national amateur championship at Baltimore.

The old master still carries one of the greatest competitive temperaments the ancient game has ever known, plus a putting touch that seems to grow surer and more deadly with age.

Quimpe's comeback last year at Beverly added a dramatic chapter to one of the game's outstanding careers. His play in the Walker cup matches, after an illness, demonstrated his ability to rise to occasions.

When I asked him how he felt during the first day's play he laughed: "Don't look as though the reports about my health were a bit exaggerated?" He did and so did his game.

The Boston veteran, long past the stage where his own ambitions are paramount where golf is concerned, takes a personal interest in the rise of the newer generation.

Especially delighted at the way Billy Howell, the young Virginia star, and Don Moe justified his confidence in their ability to contribute a winning point in the Scotch foursomes against the British.

Six of Britain's Walker cup players are booked to participate in the American championship, starting September 12, but chief interest will lie in the attempt of the current British champion, 25-year-old John De Forest, to make a comeback.

The circumstances are somewhat reminiscent of 1928 when the Brit-ten amateur champion of that year, Thomas Philip Perkins, now a professional, came back to reach the finals of the American championship at Brae Burn after being soundly trounced by Bobby Jones in the Walker cup singles, besides losing in the foursome competition. Perkins, of course, lost again to Jones in the title round but he put on a real comeback nevertheless.

Not That Bad De Forest, too, is a better golfer than he showed himself to be at Brookline. He any Tony Torrance were withered by the fiery blast of golf turned loose by Gus Moreland and Charley Weaver. They were beaten before they could get started. De Forest was nervous and undoubtedly so unstrung that it was figured of no use to send him back into the singles.

The Hartley brothers, Rex and Lester, Torrance, the Scotch dentist, Fiddian and McRivna are the other British entries listed for the national tournament.
