RECLAMATION HEAD TO VIEW OREGON IRRIGATION AREAS

SALEM, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Dr. Elwood Mead, federal commissioner of reclamation with headquarters in Washington, D. C., has written C. E. Stricklin, state engineer, that he will arrive in Portland for September 28 and 30, for the purpose of inspecting a number of irrigation projects.

Dr. Meade has requested a conference with representatives of various sections of Oregon with relation to the proposal to obtain loans from the reconstruction finance corporation with which to construct irrigation works. Mead indicated that he particularly was interested in the construction of reservoirs for storage of water for use in irrigating lands already under water and colonized.

Refinancing of irrigation districts, based on the productive value of the lands, also will be considered by Dr. Mead while in Oregon.

Chamber officials will meet soon with representatives of savings and loan associations, insurance companies and other institutions qualified to take stock in the bank. Organization details will be handled through the chamber of commerce in order to minimize organization and operating expenses.

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CLOSE CONTESTS FOR CONGRESS IN WASHINGTON VOTE

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 15.—(AP)—Close contests for the Republican nomination developed in two congressional districts in the Washington primaries as tabulation of unofficial returns neared completion today.

In the second district, Congressman Lindsey H. Hadley had a lead of only 619 votes over Payston Peterson, his closest opponent. Hadley polled 13,443 votes to 12,323 cast for Peterson.

In the new sixth district, composed of Pierce county and 140 precincts in King county, John T. McCutcheon polled 8,749 votes in the 100 precincts reported in the 357 in the district, to 7,415 votes cast for Emery Asbury, his closest competitor. There were 117 precincts yet to be heard from.

Two Republican candidates passed the 100,000 mark in the primary election. They were Senator Wesley L. Jones, who defeated Adam Beeler for the Republican nomination, polling 104,070 votes in 2,308 of the 2,682 precincts in the state to 62,226 cast for Beeler, and Lieutenant Governor John A. Gattly, who defeated Governor Roland H. Hartley 103,768 votes to 60,835 on the basis of returns from 2,330 precincts.

DETROIT MOB IRED BY HOME EVICTION

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 15.—(AP)—The house from which Mike Deodokki, his wife and three children were evicted yesterday afternoon was in ruins today, pocked by a crowd of 600 persons who assembled last night, armed with pickaxes, crowbars and other implements of destruction.

Yesterday afternoon police dispersed several hundred persons who threatened violence to a constable during the eviction. Last night police arrived too late to save the dwelling.

SHADOW WIFE OF BERN IS SUICIDE

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Sept. 15.—(AP)—Sacramento, who assumed the part in the life of Paul Bern, motion picture director who killed himself recently, was found dead today with the finding of the body of a woman in a Sacramento slough identified as that of Miss Dorothy Millette.

Both Coroner James Garlick and Ed J. Sullivan, clerk at a San Francisco hotel where the young woman had lived, said there was no doubt the body was that of Miss Millette, once known as "Mrs. Paul Bern."

Garlick said she apparently jumped to her death from a river steamer early in the morning of September 7, less than 48 hours after Bern shot himself in the Beverly Hills home he had given as a wedding gift to his bride of two months, beautiful Jean Harlow of the films.

When they asked him whether he had changed his mind over his determination to refuse food until Great Britain's adjustment of the Indian communal problem is to his liking, he said smiling:

"Why should I change my mind?"

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ATLANTIC FLYERS TO ROME MISSING; LAUNCH BIG HUNT

ROME, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Every searching agency of the Italian government was set to work today to find the missing monoplane "American Nurse," which had disappeared on a non-stop flight from New York to Rome.

She was due here last night with her crew of two men and a woman, but there was no report of the plane after 11:30 a. m. yesterday, when a steamer reported sighting it 400 miles off the southern coast of France.

As soon as he was certain that the fuel must be exhausted, even if there had been no accident, General Italo Balbo, the minister for air, ordered all lights to search for signs of the plane or for wreckage. Forestry workers, lighthouse keepers, warships and merchantmen, as well as the entire national police force were instructed to be vigilant.

If the "American Nurse" is down or lost, it would be the third failure of an attempt to fly from New York to Rome. In 1927 the "Old Glory" was lost with three victims at sea. In 1929 Roger Williams and Lewis H. Vancey started for Rome, but landed in Spain.
