The corps is scheduled to arrive here on the return south at an early hour this evening and will parade through the city, giving Medford a colorful demonstration between 8:15 and 8:30 o'clock. At 9 o'clock the corps will appear in concert at the Holy theatre.
Upon arrival in Medford last Saturday the corps was a trifle disorganized due to a wreck on the highway south of the city. The members were unable to don their uniforms but, without them, furnished the Medford public with many thrills and promise a better program tonight.

SALEM JUBILANT OVER DRUM CORPS

SALEM, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Salem was the proudest city in the United States last night as crowds lined the streets to witness a parade in honor of the Capital Post 9 American Legion drum corps, which won first place in the national drum corps competition at the Legion convention in Portland this week.
The Legion Auxiliary trio, which also won first place in competition at the convention, was similarly feted and much applause was given Charles Whittmore, who was selected as the best drum major at the convention.
Local bands and marching organizations were in the parade here and national championship notes were sounded for the first time in Salem as the corps played for Salem crowds.

SUICIDE LEAVES MYSTERY OF WIFE'S DEATH UNSOLVED

QUINCY, Mass., Sept. 15.—(AP)—Charles E. DuBois, a Tuckahoe, N. Y., jeweler, committed suicide by bringing to a climax the investigation into the mysterious disappearance of his wife Edith DuBois.
DuBois died at the Quincy hospital a short time after he had shot himself in the bath room of a rooming house, where he had been living as "Ralph Anderson."
DuBois was unconscious from the time he entered the hospital, until he died. Two state police officials were in the hospital while the doctors were trying to revive the man but they were unable to get any statement from him.
The shooting occurred while National Guardsmen were searching the woods surrounding the summer home of Mr. and Mrs. DuBois at Plymouth for Mrs. DuBois' body and state detectives and local police were searching the swampy edge of a pond in Foxboro.
DuBois had been arrested in Plymouth in connection with the disappearance, but was released when a district court judge refused to issue a murder complaint against him, as requested by police, on the ground that the authorities lacked sufficient evidence.
Police received a call shortly before noon today to go to a Hancock street rooming house. There they found DuBois lying on the bathroom floor with a bullet wound in his head. He was taken to the hospital and died without regaining consciousness.
