CULINARY CRAFT....

Prune Waffles
3 egg yolks, beaten
8 egg whites, beaten stiff
Sift dry ingredients together. Combine beaten yolks, buttermilk and melted butter. Pour into first mixture, beat well then fold in egg whites.

Corn Waffles
1/2 c sweet milk
2 eggs
1 c melted shortening
Sift dry ingredients together, add the beaten yolks with milk then the flour and melted butter, or shortening. Mix thoroughly. Fold in the stiffly beaten whites. Serve with strained honey.

Has it occurred to you that you might use your waffle iron for delicious hot desserts? To finish the cool meals you are still serving in this weather? Imagine how good cooked huckleberries are served over hot waffles! Or, perhaps you are especially fond of sliced ripe peaches served with hot waffles and cream. Or, again, you may cook the fruit in the batter and have all hot to serve with maple syrup. Certainly there are variations without end—and they are all grand! Now for some waffle recipes—in case you do not have one at the end of your fingers.

Foundation Recipe
2 cups all purpose flour
4 t baking powder
1/4 t salt
2 eggs
1 1/2 c sweet milk
6 T melted shortening

Mix and sift the dry ingredients into a bowl. Beat the eggs and add to milk with melted shortening. Combine with dry mixture and beat well.

Buttermilk Waffles
1 1/4 c flour
1/2 t salt
1 t sugar
1/2 t soda
1 c buttermilk
T melted butter

Cream butter and sugar, add beaten egg and flavoring, then the sifted dry ingredients alternately with the milk. Add coconut and drop a tablespoon on each section of the iron. Serve with thin syrup.

Spiced Waffles
6 T butter
1 c brown sugar
1 egg
1/4 c milk
1 1/2 c pastry flour
3 t baking powder

Peared Pears
1 lb. small, green pears
4 lbs. brown sugar
4 cups mild vinegar
4 cups water
1/2 cup mixed spices
Peel the pears and if small, they may be left whole. Place in a large bowl or jar in alternate layers with sugar. Cover with the water and vinegar and let stand overnight. In the morning, drain and bring the liquid to the boiling point with the spices tied in cheesecloth. Cook for ten minutes, then add the fruit and simmer until tender, but not broken. Lift the fruit from the syrup with a perforated spoon and place carefully in sterilized jars. Boil the syrup down until slightly thickened then pour over the fruit in jars and seal.
