TIPS on Contract

PSYCHIC BOOMERANG By Tom O'Neill

In the course of bidding toward game or slam some players are prone to name a suit in which they hold a singleton. The purpose is to dissuade the opponents from leading that suit.

The deceiving bid succeeds at times when there is a no trump contract. Under such conditions the opening lead of any suit except the one bid psychically will result in game for declarer.

Outstanding players are suspicious when they have length in a suit bid by the opponents. As a defense they will open that suit.

In point is a hand played in the southern New England championship in which a heart was bid as a psychic by a player whose partner eventually contracted for game in no trump. He was set two tricks through a heart opening.

Miss Florence Fitch and Mrs. Hilda Maude Zentlein of the Deschanelles Club, New York, were the defending pair, and it was Miss Fitch, her suspicions aroused, who opened the heart.

West opened the auction with an offering of one diamond, north passed and east bid two no trump. South passed and west bid three hearts. East then went to three no trump.

Miss Fitch led her fourth best heart, she and partner taking six heart tricks before the declarer got in.

CRATER FILMS TO BE SHOWN LAND

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore., Sept. 15. — (Sp.) — Several thousand feet of scenic motion picture film, devoted to Crater Lake and destined for national distribution, were taken in the park during the past month by Robert Klissack, Jr., director of the University Film Foundation of Harvard university. A recent preview of the pictures revealed the results of a high type of photography, including complete views of the lake and of points of interest within the park not generally known to the visiting public.

The films include an enlightening record of a typical rim caravan, a daily occurrence and a popular attraction for thousands of visitors during the course of the season. The beauties of the lake are faithfully revealed in pictures taken while on boat trips about the lake and along the bases of towering crater walls.

There are interesting shots of the "Pinnacles," on the east entrance road, presenting true pictorial conceptions of these towering spectral spires of sandstone. A camera trip through Liao's Hallway, along the west entrance road, is enlightening in many details of this particular scenic point.

Mr. Klissack arrived at Crater Lake from Yosemite national park, where he had spent several weeks filming a field trip of a party of Boy Scout naturalists in the country of Yosemite. The trip was planned and arranged by Ansel Hall, chief forester and senior naturalist of the national park service. A preview of the Yosemite films was held at Crater Lake a few nights ago.

BUTTER SUPPLY AT PORTLAND GAINS

PORTLAND, Sept. 15. — (AP) — Increased stocks of freshly churned butter are noticeable in the local trade. Late receipts from out-of-state points show a rather liberal increase over the preceding week and there was a like gain in the churning of centralizers.

The country movement in this direction is receiving aid from the less keen demand from California points, although no late changes of moment are reflected there.

Butterfat situation appears strong. The result of the continued dry weather, created additional strength in that line today on the East Side Farmers' wholesale market. There was a better call for all cucumbers with the possible exception of slicing or table stock. No. 1 pickling sold mostly 40c box with 30c the general price for 3s.

Peach market situation appears changing. Elbertas are inclined to rule easy while J. H. Hales are firmer to slightly higher. A nickel better was obtained for some offerings during the day. Chief demand is for The Dalles and the Willamette valley offerings with Yakima still suffering as a result of the recent seizures by officials for misbranding. Sales of Elbertas were generally 25c with a few 30c box, while J. H. Hales sold 35-45c box.

Potato market was less active with sales slow and inclined to show a trifle weakness. Onions were easy to a nickel lower with sales of Oregon 70-75c and Walla Walla down to 50c central. Dillard canteloupes showed a wide spread of quality with the best around 85c.

BRITISH TOURISTS OVERRUN SPANISH COAST RESORTS

Three English cruises deposited 2,000 tourists here in one day. Thirteen cruise ships have called at Barcelona since May, twelve of them being British.

MONEY AFFAIRS OF 'PEPCO' ON GRILL

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 15. — (AP) — Investigation of the Portland Electric Power company's relations with the Central Public Service company, of Chicago, the holding company, continued here today under the direction of Charles M. Thomas, Oregon public utilities commissioner.

Most of Thursday, the opening of the hearing, was devoted to statistical testimony by Claude R. Lester, commission engineer. Testimony was introduced to show that when the Pacific Northwest Public Service company bought the Seattle gas company it changed the

book value of the gas company stock from \$458,946.25 to \$6,753,748.40. The state also presented figures to show that the Central Public Service company listed \$6,283,241.45 in addition to the \$16,314,117.55 plant and franchise value of the Seattle gas company as assets of the corporation. The state alleged that \$7,331,250, proceeds of the sale of the Portland General Electric company's 4 per cent gold notes of a par value of \$7,500,000 were retained by the Central Public Service company. Thomas said he had been asked by numerous persons to investigate these alleged deals and said all money transactions between the companies would be thoroughly investigated.
