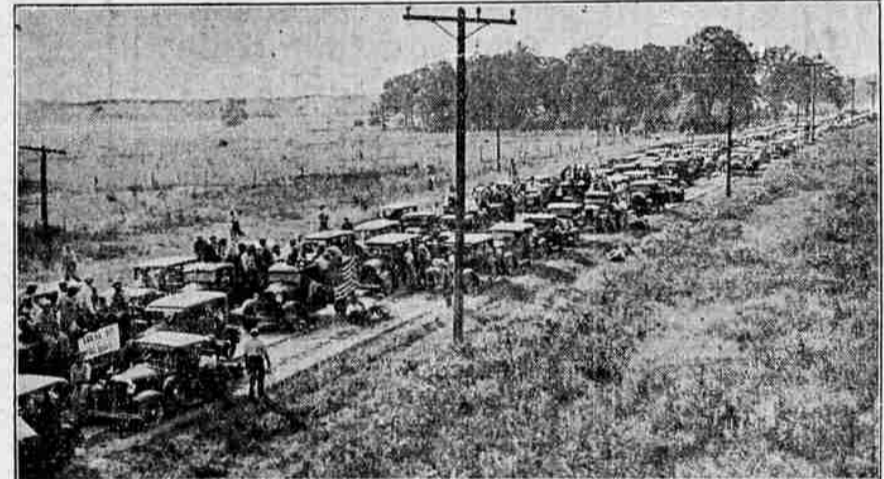

HOME TOWN FETES OLYMPIC HERO



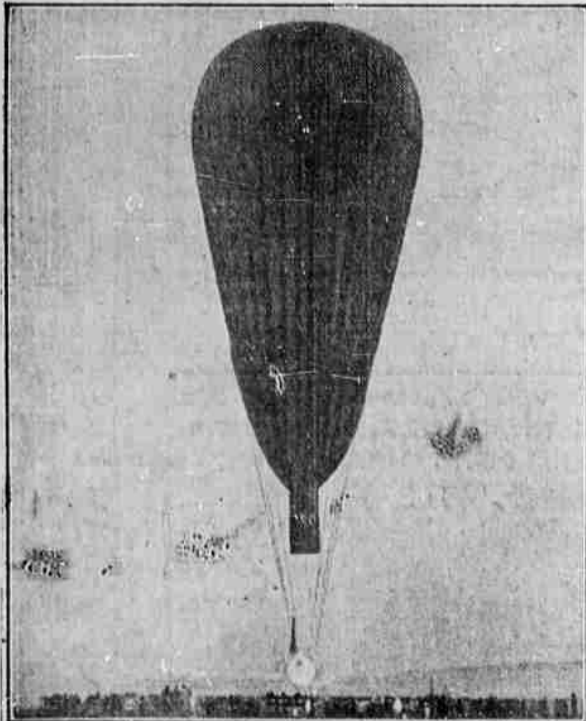

Surveys Air Line



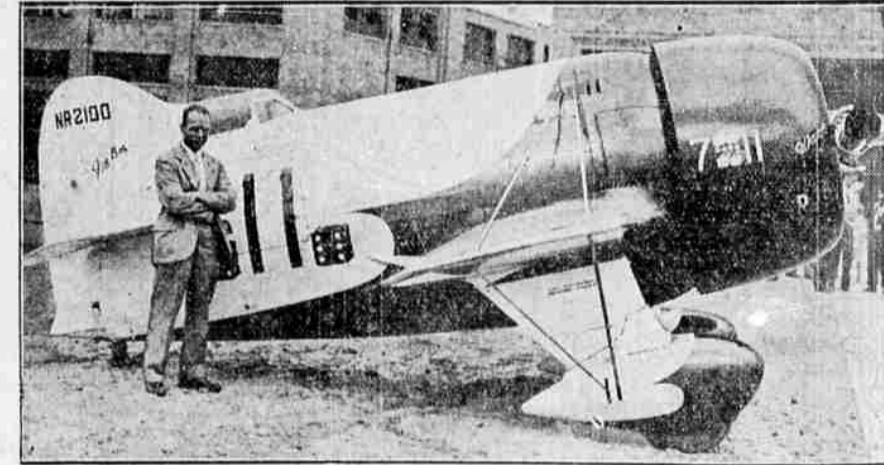

DOOLITTLE TO FLY BOARDMAN'S PLANE IN AIR RACES



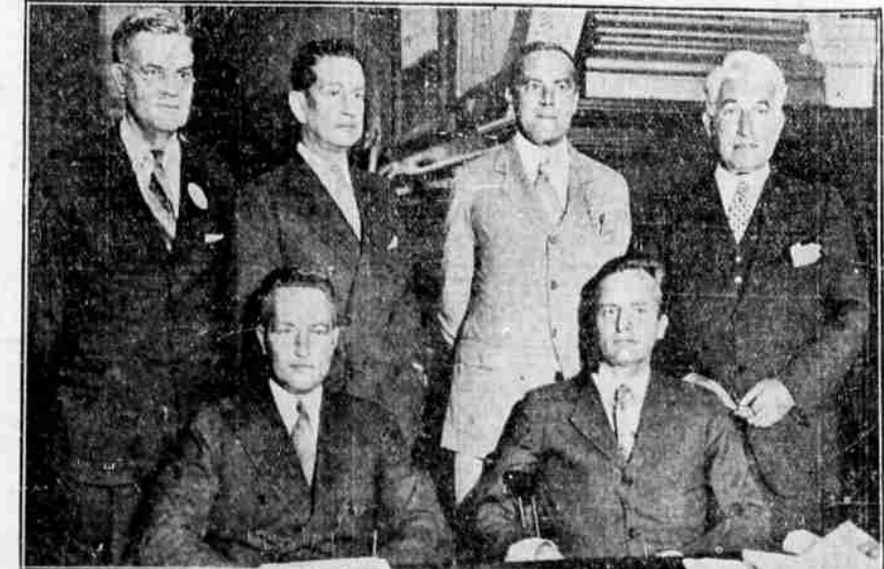
