

JOE MEYER WINS BRADFISH CUP IN SUNDAY REGATTA

With a perfect day for racing, a large crowd of southern Oregon speed boat fans attended the regatta at Savage Rapids dam yesterday afternoon, sponsored by the Southern Oregon Boat club. A number of entries were listed in each event, with Joe Meyer, driving "Irish Luck," winning permanent possession of the Bradfish cup.

Spectators were given the thrills of some up-sets, when "Dutch" Welch turned his boat over, when the steering wheel came out. He was back in the course shortly after, however, when he replaced the motor on his craft. The Klamath ship "Repeat" lost its motor, causing some excitement.

"Krazy Jane" from Eureka lived up to her name, and her driver could not get the motor to function properly. Floyd House, who experienced a little difficulty with "House Afire," showed several of the contestants some close driving.

Winners in all four events used Gilmore gas, the committee in charge of the races reported. Many beautiful merchandise gifts were awarded by Medford's leading merchants, in each of the races.

As added features of the boat program, Leonard Hall of Jacksonville and Bohmert of Central Point rode surf-boards up and down the course, and Hall also gave an excellent exhibition of aqua skiing.

The opening event was run by boats in class B, with stock C motors in a double heat of two miles. Jim Daily took first place, driving "Beverly Jean." John Ohmert second, "Blue Devil," and Ahliah Woods third in "Flying Chips."

Those who had each won the Bradfish trophy previously, competed in the free-for-all for permanent possession with Joe Meyers finishing in the lead, driving "Irish Luck." "Holsum," driven by Heine Fluhrer, was second; "Cecilia," Dutch Welch, third; "House Afire," Floyd House, fourth; and "Klamath Flyer," Art Vroman, fifth.

John Bohmert was winner of the run-about, a two heat race of five miles each. He was followed in by Ahliah Woods, Earl Voorhies of Grants Pass, and Jim Daily.

The final contest, two five-mile heats, was taken by Harold Grey, driver of "Irish Luck," followed by "House Afire," Floyd House, second; "Cecilia," Dutch Welch, third; "Klamath Flyer," Art Vroman of Klamath Falls, fourth; and "Holsum," Heine Fluhrer, fifth.

Alec Stevens presided as starter, with Hanson Webster, Harry Powell and Jack Sparrin as judges. K. M. C. Neill of Grants Pass, and Joe Marshall of Medford were in charge of the pick-up boats.

MEDFORD GRIDMEN WILL TEST POWER IN GO WITH WEED

Medford high school's football team will play its first game of the season against the Weed, Cal., high school, at the Junior high school field next Saturday afternoon.

The Burghermesters will be heavier than last year, and have 13 lettermen on the squad, with a number of husky freshmen and some new material to draw upon. This week will see some hard scrimmaging, with much time devoted to signal practice. Some of last year's squad, who have delayed their education to work, are expected back this and next week. These include Galinski and Knips. Pre-season boasts include the claim that the line will be better and the backfield faster. All the squad is in fine physical condition and well-grounded in the Burgher style of play.

The Weed team will be making its first appearance on a Medford field in nearly 10 years. Their last appearance here was against a Callison team, and they were walloped by an outrageous score.

Weed was defeated by Klamath Falls last Saturday, 33 to 0, and the victory was hailed by the Pelicans, who have adopted as their 1932 slogan, "On to Portland." They figure they are state championship material, and are putting in their big early. The Burghermesters will go out to exceed the Klamath score, though Coach Burgher said he would probably give the second and third squads most of the work, since the game was salted away. Football spirit is running high in Klamath county and 106 boys turned out for opening practice. They are pointing for their game with Medford, which will be played here.

Ashland's squad this year is under the coaching of Don Faber, Williamette university star and Central Point boy. For his first practice, 35 players turned out. Faber is one of the younger coaches of southern Oregon. The Grants Pass team has about 40 men in uniform, and is figuring to be a tough team to beat. They are making no boasts, but are apt to be a hard nut to crack, for any squad.

The Medford Junior high school squad, under direction of Coach Ray Henderson, is drilling hard, and will soon swing into action against secondary schools of southern Oregon.

BEAVERS REGAIN PENNANT STRIDE IN DOUBLE BILL

Portland's Beavers regained their pennant stride with a vengeance over the week-end, taking three games from the in-and-out Seals, while the second place Hollywood Stars lost ground in the championship race, winning only two out of three games with Sacramento.

The Beavers pounded out 15 hits to beat San Francisco, 13 to 6, in Saturday's game. Shortstop Sankey led the attack with four safeties in four times at bat.

Bill Shores, formerly of the Athletics, allowed the Seals only seven hits in Sunday's opener while his mates were collecting the same number of Guido Simoni to win, 3 to 2. The Beavers found Jimmy Zinn's offerings to their liking in the second game and hit safely 13 times to win 6 to 2.

Jimmy DeShong was effective in the pinches and pitched Sacramento to a 7 to 5 victory over the Stars Saturday.

Three Sacramento errors combined with 10 Hollywood hits to give the Stars the first game of Sunday's doubleheader, 6 to 8. Hollywood took the nightcap, 4 to 1.

Los Angeles was still in a tie with Sacramento for fourth place in the league standings after beating Seattle 3 to 2 in 13 innings on Saturday and losing to the Indians, 11 to 5 and 10 to 8, on Sunday.

The San Francisco Missions sank further into the cellar over the week-end, dropping two out of three games to Oakland. The Oaks won the Saturday game, 6 to 3, and the Sunday opener, 11 to 3, with the Missions taking the second game of the doubleheader, 1 to 0.

CUBS PREPARING FOR FINAL FIGHT

Given an off-day by the schedule makers today, the Chicago Cubs collected all their forces for a last ditch grapple with the Pittsburgh Pirates that may clinch the National league pennant for the Cubs no later than tomorrow.

Their spectacular 4-3 victory over the Cincinnati Reds in 15 innings yesterday put the Cubs in a position where they can clinch the flag by any one victory over the Pirates in the four-game series which opens with a double header in Wrigley field tomorrow. Single games will be played Wednesday and Thursday. Even should the Pirates sweep the series and win their four closing games with the St. Louis Cardinals, the Cubs still could win the pennant by beating Cincinnati in their last two games Saturday and Sunday.
