INDIANAPOLIS Sept. 20.—(AP)—The Masonic fraternity was called upon today by Leon M. We must take positive, constructive and vigorous personal action in all of our contacts and relations in social, economic and political life."

GERMAN PARTICIPATION IS HOPE OF AMERICA WASHINGTON, Sept. 20.—(AP)—President Hoover today issued a statement saying that the United States was divorced from what he termed "the German arms question," but said this country was anxious that Germany shall continue to participate in the arms conference.

The president referred to press dispatches from abroad, and it was assumed by his aides he referred to reports that Senator Reed and Ambassador Edges had informed French authorities the American people believed Germany's recent move for armament equality was inopportune.
