

A'S AND SENATORS OPEN TUSSLE FOR RUNNER-UP PLACE

Interest in Closing Days of Pennant Race Centers in Three-Game Series — Solons Must Win All

Most of the excitement to be gleaned from the closing days of the major league pennant race is wrapped up in the final three-game series between the series to win runner-up honors. A single victory would clinch the spot for the A's.

Fox in Homer Stunt.
Then there is Jimmie Fox, mauling first baseman of the Mackmen, and his assault on a couple of home-run records, including that of the

mighty George Herman (Babe) Ruth. Fox cracked his 55th and 56th of the season yesterday as the Athletics dropped a 10-inning struggle to the champion Yankees, 8 to 7.

The total of 53 homers ties the record for right-hand hitters, set by Hack Wilson with the Chicago Cubs in 1930. Another for the Maryland mauler would break Wilson's mark, and four more would tie Ruth's great string of 50, set in '21. Four of them in three games is a large order, but there is an outside possibility he'll do it.

Solons Stay in Race.
The Senators remained in the scrap for second by beating the Boston Red Sox again, 4 to 2. General Alvin Crowder yielded but four hits to score his 14th straight triumph and his 25th of the year.

Over in the National league, the Pittsburgh Pirates continued to pour it on the champion Chicago Cubs, who are in no mood to be bothered by such trifles. Hal Smith, a youngster purchased from Kansas City, set the champs down with six hits and blanked them, 7 to 0. Paul Waner hit his 59th two-bagger of the year, tying Chuck Klein's National league record.

Brooklyn tightened its hold on third place by taking its final from the Giants, 7 to 2, as Glenn Wright and Joe Stripp hit the ball hard. George Puccinelli and Charlie Wilson, members of the St. Louis Cardinals' newest rookie crop, hit home runs to help beat Cincinnati, 8 to 5.

WISCONSIN RESULT SHOWS PEOPLE TO STAND BY HOOVER

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Sept. 23.—(AP) Vice-President Curtis sees the Republican nominations in Tuesday's Wisconsin primary as indications that "the people are going to stand by the President."

He passed through Nashville today en route from Chattanooga to Bowling Green, Ky., on his political campaign.

"I am glad to see the regulars nominated because it shows the people are going to stand by the President," he said with reference to the balloting in Wisconsin. "The sweeping victory of the two regulars shows the trend of the country."

He referred to Walter J. Kohler, who defeated Gov. Phil LaFollette for the gubernatorial nomination, and John B. Chapple, who won the senatorial nomination over Senator John J. Blaine.

Before a large crowd at Chattanooga last night, the 72-year-old vice-president said he opposed cancellation of foreign war debts, and declared the United States would be the "first large country to recover from the depression."

Curtis said there had been 17 depressions in the history of the United States, "and each time we have come out stronger than before."
