ASHLAND GANG TO RECEIVE SENTENCE IN BURGLARY CASE

Sentencing of three members of the so-called "Ashland Gang" who last July burglarized the J. C. Penney store there, is awaiting the wishes of Circuit Judge H. D. Norton, busy with trial procedure. It will probably be at the conclusion of the present jury case before the court.

Two members of the alleged gang—Lester (Buck) Wilson, and Luther Crosby, are on parole from the state prison of Salem. They were given their liberty last May. Emalie (Bobby) Maustfield, 22, who, it is said, has been the beneficiary of half a dozen paroles, is held as member of the gang. Virgil (Dodo) Burnett, 18, is held as a member. Two Ashland girls are also involved in the crime in minor capacities. All but Wilson, the district attorney's office says, have made confessions, and are willing to enter guilty pleas.

The Maustfield woman, according to the district attorney's office, was a "bad influence" among Ashland girls. The mother of Luther Crosby has interviewed the district attorney relative to leniency for her son. She asks that his present parole be revoked, and that he not be sentenced on the new charge. Under prison rules, Crosby must serve the balance of his first term, as a parole violator, and then any sentence that may be imposed upon him for the present charge.

Wilson, who with Crosby was sentenced to state prison for the robbery of the Stogery in Ashland, claims that he is a victim of circumstances and was not involved in the Penney robbery. Authorities claim that when arrested he was wearing clothes stolen from the J. C. Penney store.

CODDING OPPOSES TOLLEFSON PLEA

A motion in opposition to granting the plea of Alvin Tollefson, through his attorneys, for a further extension of 30 days for filing of briefs in an appeal to the state supreme court, was presented yesterday by District Attorney George A. Coddling. The opposing motion contends that two extensions have been granted and that any legal points involved do not justify further delay.

The defense counsel pleads that further time is needed for writing of the briefs, and that a grave constitutional right is involved, of value alike to the state and the defendant.

Tollefson is under a two-year sentence in state prison for confessed perpetration of the Central Point bank robbery hoax last May. The amount involved was about \$500 and the bank sustained no loss by reason of embezzlement.

All further legal procedure in the case is in the hands of the state supreme court, the Jackson county circuit court, or Circuit Judge H. D. Norton having no further jurisdiction in the matter.

YOUNG REPUBLICAN ORGANIZATION FOR MEDFORD FORMED

About thirty young men and women of Medford and surrounding points, gathered at the Medford Hotel last evening to perfect the organization of the Young Republican league, with Jack Porter as chairman. Officers were not elected, as no representatives were in attendance from Ashland. The committee is to meet Monday to draw up the constitution.

Frank P. Farrell, local attorney, gave a short talk at the opening of the meeting, and expressed favor in forming the club of young people, who could study political issues and not become embroiled with arguments and quarrels of the older politicians.

Republican headquarters in Portland have announced that Vice-President Curtis is planning a western trip, and if he visits Oregon, Medford will be one of his stopping places. Mr. Farrell suggested that the meeting, if scheduled, be conducted by the young organization.

Chairman Porter called on Frank Perl to tell some of the plans of the proposed club, and it was recommended that declaration of intentions be drawn up for adoption at the next meeting, when officers are to be named.

Attorney William McAllister was elected temporary chairman of the gathering.


