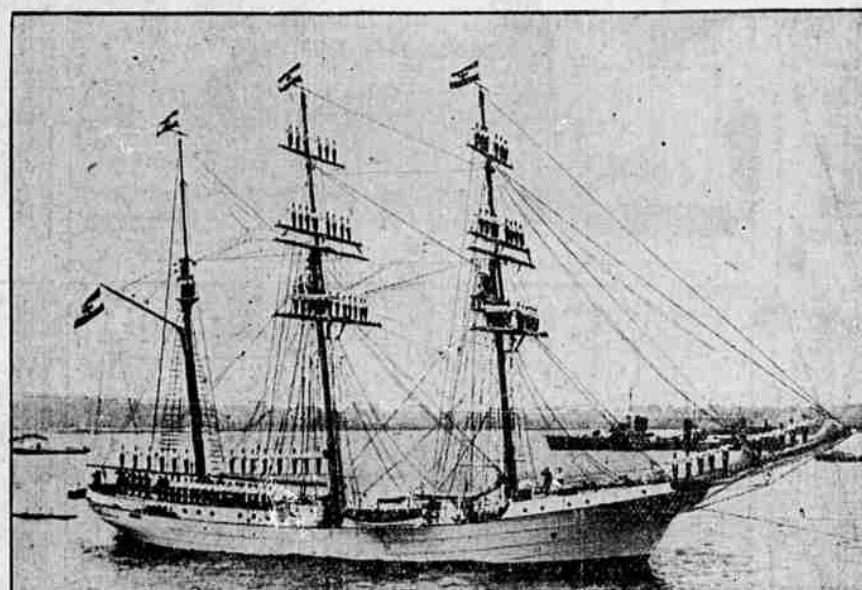

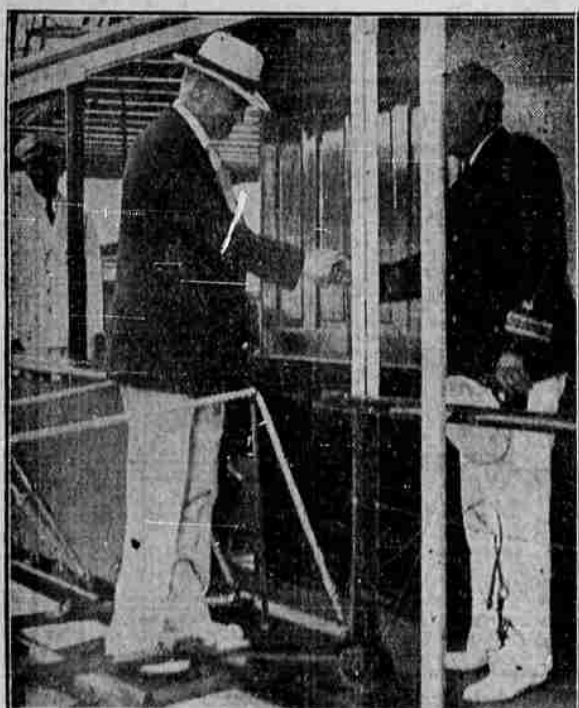

# GERMAN TRAINING SHIP, SINKS; 69 CADETS DIE



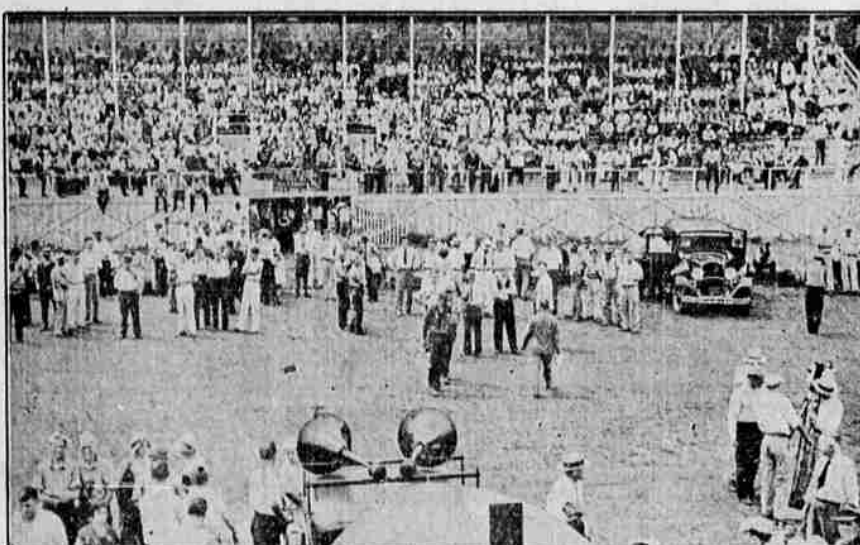
