

TIGERS TRAMPLE WEED 37 TO 0 IN GRIDIRON OPENER

Burgherites Display Potential Power Against Invaders—Local Goal Never In Danger—Need Polish.

Medford high school's football team defeated Weed, Calif., 37 to 0 Saturday afternoon in the Junior high school grounds. The Burgherites showed little in the way of plays but plenty of potential power when the teamwork is smoothed out. Penalties and fumbles were costly in the first quarter for the locals. The game was played in near fall-summer heat. The home squad loaded in the second and fourth quarters and second string men were substituted.

The visitors showed a flash of strength when they made two first downs in succession with forward passes. Fichtner went across with the first touchdown late in the first quarter. In the next period Galinski with long end runs, and Fichtner with off-tackle drives, carried the ball across.

Open Third With Rush Medford started the third quarter with a rush, and scored two touchdowns again with Galinski and Fichtner carrying the ball. Laidley, end, scored a long forward pass to score the fifth touchdown of the game. Galinski went across for the final score, after Medford had been penalized twice for offside.

The Burgherites waged a steady and consistent battle throughout, interspersed with fumbles and poor passing from center. Kuzman substituted for Bennett at end, played a spectacular game. Fichtner, Galinski, Kuzman and Laidley starred for the home squad. The entire team showed the lack of precision and polish that will come with a couple of games under their belt.

Goal Never Dangers Medford's goal was never in danger and practically the entire game was played in Weed territory. Medford completed seven out of 12 forward passes, Skinner dropping two. Medford gained three times the yardage of the foe, who opened an aerial attack in the closing minutes, that netted them three good gains. The Medford line was strong and beefy.

Near the end of both halves the second string took up the burden. Next Saturday Medford plays Treka, here.

A report of fishing conditions was received yesterday from Frank L. Taylor of the fish and game committee, Reedsport chamber of commerce, listing the advantageous points for best results.
Sea-run cutthroat are now entering the streams there, he reports, and fair baskets have been caught the past week along the lower Umpqua to Scottsburg, also in the Schofield river. Large size Bear Valley spinners, baited with chub, are recommended for the cutthroats.
Good fishing has been reported from Loon lake, black bass and cat fish being brought in. At Lake Tahkenitch, Mr. Taylor states, perch and catfish are biting good on worms, though the black bass have not been so prominent of late.
"At Smith river above the falls, trout fishing was never better," the report states. "The fish are in excellent condition and take the fly and bait well."

Mere Length Bad Driving Slogan



Be careful of that extra distance in your drives. I have had club members playing consistently in the 80's, who have utterly ruined their game by attempting to add 50 yards to their tee-shots.
A 150-yard drive straight down the middle of the fairway is far better than 250 yards into the woods or rough.
Accuracy, rather than distance, should be the aim of every golfer, particularly that vast majority of players whose only opportunity for the game comes on week-end holidays.
A perfect drive is probably the most satisfying shot in the game, but it must always be remembered that a straight drive is far more to be desired than a long one, and is important, too, in that it does much towards putting you in the right frame of mind for your second shot.

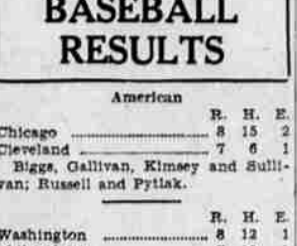

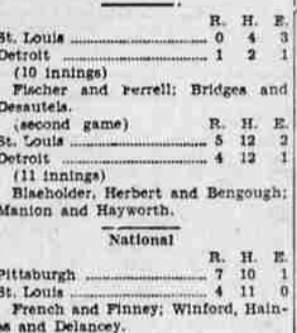
MRS. THOMPSON WINS GOLF CUPS

RELIEF CLOTHING SHOP IS PLANNED FOR UNEMPLOYED

Miss Helen Carlton will head a committee appointed by Mrs. A. E. Reames of the women's division of the Jackson county unemployment relief council, which will plan and manage a county relief clothing shop to function through cooperation with the county court, the Red Cross, and the Salvation Army.

A central governing committee will determine who may receive aid and what payment or labor will be exacted for such assistance. The official "go, go" of the local Red Cross, county court or Salvation Army will be necessary before any clothing will be given out to applicants.
Miss Carlton yesterday explained that such precaution is necessary due to the fact that many well meaning persons have been aiding families who were in some cases imposing upon their benefactors, other agencies already having made provision for their aid. Miss Carlton suggests that before assisting such families inquiries be made through the county court, Red Cross or Salvation Army to find out whether or not assistance is being given through these agencies, thus avoiding indiscriminate aid.
Provision will be made for a system of exchange of goods for labor, such as the mending and remodeling of garments contributed by the public for the relief shop and the making of patch work quilts or other utilization of all material on hand.
Two sewing machines have been provided and the executive board of the Greater Medford club has contributed \$10 toward the purchase of another, these to be placed in a work room, the location of which will be determined at an early date.
Miss Harriet Sparrow will act as secretary of this new committee which includes also Mrs. H. D. McCaskey, Mrs. C. I. Drummond, C. Glenn Smith, Mrs. David Rosenberg, Mrs. R. R. Duncan, Mrs. B. E. Munter, Miss Francis Sparrow, and Miss Helen Bullis.
