The Western Pine association, with headquarters in Portland, Ore., has also reported an increase in business during the week of August 6 in the western pine territory.

Prices Increased. "Average prices have increased from \$1.50 to \$2.00 per thousand feet during the past 60 days," the West Coast Lumbermen's association said.

The association attributed the increase to "the very low production schedules at individual mills and the fact that such operators as were making lumber during the period did so at a cost of from \$3.00 to \$4.00 per thousand board feet above the amount that could be realized for the lumber."
