Altering Style Harms Putting

Missing a three-foot putt inevitably makes a player timid in approaching his next shot.

In the belief that he has been in error in some fundamental rule, he attempts to change his stance and stroke, and this change all too often is for the worse.

In many cases, this "complex" causes the player to look up too soon in his anxiety to follow the ball. This action is the secret of many a bungled putt.

If you are putting badly, no matter how strong the temptation may be, do not change your regular style in any respect.

In practicing with the putter, remember to put for the back of the cup. Line up your putt, take your usual stance, play the stroke in your regular style, and don't look up until you hear the ball drop into the cup.

actually suspected of murdering him stunned and horrified me, but it didn't matter. The fact that he was dead caused nothing to matter until I knew positively that I was to have a child. With that knowledge, with that gleam of happiness, I had something to live for, something to fight for. And now I want to go through with the trial. I want no strings left, no doubts left in people's minds as to my innocence. I don't only want acquittal; I want a complete apology."

Morehouse asked her to tell him of the happenings of the night of Smith Reynolds' death. The Sun quoted her as saying:

"It was about 12:30 o'clock, I believe, when I heard Smith call out my name. I saw him standing beside the bed, our bed, with a pistol to his temple. I remember nothing more, though I had the feeling of holding his head in my arms and having the warm blood pouring through my nightdress against my skin. I remember nothing that happened there."

She described Smith as "morbid." "I'd often sit up with him until 6 o'clock in the morning, arguing and pleading. He had some strange delusion that I was going to leave him. He'd often disappear for hours at night and come back weeping with joy because I had not fled."

She said he was "never without a pistol."

"He often said to me, 'If anything happens, there's always a little Mauser.' Many many times I'd see him holding the pistol to his head. More times than I can remember he threatened suicide."

The baby she is expected will be named "Smith," the Sun's interview said. "Boy or girl, that's to be the name," was the way she expressed it.

"It will be hard to convince people that I married Smith Reynolds because I loved him," she said, "there were times when I pleaded with him to get himself disinherited. I told him we could get along. During my married life I paid my own way. I saw nothing of any Reynolds money. Why, I had much more money than Smith had—much more. I made a lot of money on the stage."

"This trial will take every penny I can scrape up. I'll have a child to support. I'll go back on the stage. That's the only thing I know how to do."

She was asked where she would like to have the child born.

"I don't know. Not Cincinnati—the south. Maybe in France. I feel like a man without a country. But tell Broadway that it's my fight and I'm game; that I can take it."

The interview in the Sun said Mrs. Reynolds is the guest of a friend at a "remote and beautiful estate."
