

# Gibbs and McGale to Settle Argument in Armory Ring Tonight

## HECTIC COMBAT PROMISED WHEN PUNCHERS MEET

Boasts and Threats Hint Hot Action for Main Event—Red Heads to Renew Feud in Semi-Final Bout

Jack Gibbs, Medford's current ring pride, will face one of the highest burles of his ring career tonight when he meets Frisco McGale, colored Seattle puncher, in the 10-round main event on Promoter Mack Lillard's card at the armory.

McGale and Gibbs have engaged for several days in an exchange of threats and boasts as to what they intend to do to each other when the gong sounds, and the heat engendered, together with the known ability of both boys to deal out punishing punches, should result in a hectic combat.

In addition to the main event, ring fans will see a pair of old favorites, Circus Red Howe and Red Hansaker, in a renewal of their perennial feud over the six-round route. This pair of sandy-fisted gladiators never fail to produce plenty of thrills for the cash customers, as neither is willing to admit the other is the better man.

Three additional bouts are carded, including a pair of husky tyros, Emerson Babb and Frank Nelson, Jack Simms of Sams Valley and Court Mitchell and Charles Norman and Lloyd Barkoff.

A "surprise" bout to open the show is promised by Promoter Lillard, with the angle mixed in through the contestants carrying the "non-de-restin" of "Rowdy Roosevelt" and "Hurricane Hoover."

Advance seat sales and interest of the fans indicate tonight's show will be one of the largest drawing cards staged here by Lillard, who has been remarkably successful in his past efforts to please southern Oregon fight followers.

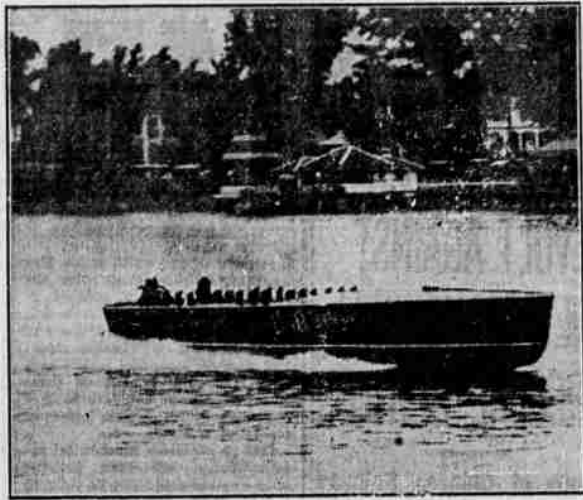

## PORTLAND NEEDS FOUR WINS FOR FLAG CERTAINTY

(By the Associated Press) Portland held a much firmer grip on the 1932 Coast League pennant after trouncing Seattle, 12 to 3, on the Ducks' home field Tuesday night while the second place Hollywood Stars were dropping a game to Los Angeles.

With but six games remaining to be played, Portland needs but four more victories to become mathematically certain of the championship. The Ducks now lead Hollywood by three full games.

Seattle was only two runs behind the league leaders until the last half of the seventh inning, when Alameda dropped a fly. Three Ducks scored on the misplay, and before the inning was over they had collected seven runs and cinched the game. Hollywood met a costly setback Tuesday night when the Angels came out ahead in a close 3-to-2 game at Los Angeles.

With the season almost at an end, the seventh-place Oaks and the cellar Mission suddenly found their batting power Tuesday and began to play winning ball. Oakland walked Sacramento, 11 to 2, at Oakland, and the Missions buried San Francisco under a barrage of 18 base hits to win, 15 to 5.

An unusual attraction—an Oriental pitching duel—was announced for the Wednesday game between Sacramento and Oakland. Le Gum Hong, believed to be the first Chinese to enter organized baseball, will pitch for the Oaks and will be opposed by Kenzo Nuhida, diminutive Japanese hurler.

## Quake Destroys Old Monuments

ATHENS, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Many precious Byzantine monuments were reported today destroyed by the earthquake which hit Greece Monday night and which is known to have resulted in the deaths of 127 persons. Whole villages were destroyed in the vicinity of Mount Athos, where the monuments were broken up, and it was said it was still impossible to determine how many dead were still under the ruins left by the quake.

## YREKA GRIDDERS HARBOR HOPE OF TAMING TIGERS

(By Claude Manke) Since their last week's victory over the powerful Redding squad, 7-0, the Yreka team is looking forward rather optimistically to their game with Medford, to be played on the local field Saturday, October 1.

The southern team has about three teams running signals, and will probably bring two full ones up here. The squad is much lighter than the locals, having only one man, tackle, weighing more than 180 pounds, and the whole team averages only about 150.

According to reports, the Redding game was a hard fought one, and showed the Yreka eleven in an unexpected position, that of victor, for the odds were all against her. She now expects to carry off the northern California conference title.

The following players were outstanding in last Saturday's game: Lave Bresolin, 170-pound letterman and fullback, is rather well known for his line-smashing ability, and was their chief ground gainer; Healy, playing end, has the advantage of one year of first string competition, and the quarter right half; Smith and Brazil, while light and fast are shifty. Both weigh in under 140. The Yreka tackling is handled by Lang, West and Galkins.

The Californians are coached by Geo. Gustafson. The tentative lineup for Saturday's game is: Left end, Ohio Zarotta; left tackle, Lee Lange; left guard, Bill McCoy; center, Ed Sawyers; right guard, Dominic Favero; right tackle, F. West; right end, Hesse; quarterback, Charles Smith; right half, John Favero; fullback, Lave Bresolin.

## WEBFOOTS FACE TOUGH OPPONENT NEXT SATURDAY

Santa Clara, Conqueror of California, Will Invade Eugene—Oregon State to Play Stanford at Portland

(By RUSSELL J. NEWLAND (Associated Press Sports Writer) SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 27.—(AP)—With preliminary engagements behind them, eight of the ten members of the Pacific coast conference will line up this week-end in games bearing of the 1932 championship.

The opening battle in the annual scramble for the major circuit title will take place Friday night at Los Angeles with Coach Leo Calland's University of Idaho Vandals opposing Bill Spaulding's University of California at Los Angeles Bruins.

Idaho Now Powerful. Not much of a factor in conference play for several seasons, Idaho gave indications of going somewhere this year by administering a 49-0 trouncing to Whitman last Saturday. U. C. L. A. likewise made a strong impression in its non-conference test last week with a 26-0 victory over the California Aggies.

Saturday's outstanding battle will pit Southern California's Trojans, 1931 conference champions, against Washington State's Cougars. The northern eleven will bring to Los Angeles a new-found power that saw it crush College of Idaho, 40-0 last week-end. The Trojans, favorites to defend their championship, also opened their season in convincing fashion with a 35-0 defeat of University of Utah.

In running the Utes into the ground, Coach Howard Jones' Trojans revealed a swift breaking offense, built around a set of speedy backfield men.
