YREKA TO TURN HISTORY PAGES BACK FOR FETE

A realistic revival of the old mining days when Yreka was known as "Thompson's Dry Digging" is expected to draw thousands of visitors to northern California on October 7 and 8. The celebration, which has been named the "Gold Rush" is being put on by the Yreka Miners, booster club, to revive interest in gold mining, provide jobs for the unemployed and raise funds to help take care of the city's destitute during the coming winter. Assisting the "Yreka Miners" is the newly organized "Gold Diggers" organization composed of Yreka women, who are doing their bit to make the project a success. The "Gold Diggers" are advertising the coming fete by appearing in old-time costumes, and the male sex are attired in pioneer garb and novel whiskered effects which baffled description.

A big two-day program is planned for the entertainment of the many southern Oregon and northern California folks who will attend the "Gold Rush." Sports events, including bicycle races, a football game, championship horsehoe pitching contest and other items of interest have already been arranged for. Pioneer proscriptions will compete in the marking and panning contests, as well as the rock drilling competition. An old-time fiddlers' contest will be held Friday night and dances of both old-time and modern variety will hold forth each night. Gambling games of every description will run day and night, and a special bank will be opened to provide "phony" money for the various games and concessions.

One of the leading events of the entire two-day program will be the pioneer parade which takes place Saturday, October 8 at 10 a. m. Many Vehicles of ancient vintage will be in the procession. Old stage coaches, covered wagons and pack trains will pass in review along the streets of the old mining town, where in years past they were the order of the day. Men, women and children garbed in the costumes of the early fifties will be much in evidence, adding a colorful touch to this novel historical pageant. Moving pictures of the parade and other outstanding events will be taken, preserving a permanent record of this unique pioneer celebration.

The Yreka "Gold Miners" and the "Gold Diggers" as well as extending a cordial invitation to everyone in southern Oregon to participate in their festivities on Friday and Saturday, October 7 and 8.

FIVE LIFERS GET LIBERTY THROUGH ACTION BY MEIER

SALEM, Sept. 29.—(P)—Communities of sentence were granted Wednesday by Governor Julius L. Meier to five men serving life sentences at the state penitentiary for various degrees of murder. Two other convicts were given conditional pardons. Good behavior and valuable service to the institution were the bases for leniency.

Floyd Henderson and Irving L. Stoop, received at the penitentiary October 10, 1920, to serve life terms for alleged participation in the jail break and subsequent slaying of Sheriff T. J. Taylor of Umatilla county, had sentences commuted to 20 years. Records in the executive department indicated that Henderson and Stoop had no part in the actual slaying. Employment has been promised both men.

Russell Hecker, received May 20, 1924, to serve a life term for the alleged slaying of Frank Bowker of Multnomah county, over a liquor transaction quarrel and subsequent dumping of the body into the Calapoosia river, received commutation to a 20-year term.

Domitico Pacini, received March 8, 1915, from Multnomah county on a life sentence for second degree murder, received commutation to a 25-year term.
