WOULD-BE VOTERS ARE GIVEN ADVICE BY COUNTY CLERK

County Clerk Deliah S. Meyer has issued the following statement relative to voters' registration for the general election November 8:

"Many inquiries are received each day regarding qualifications of a voter and the necessity to re-register. The following are requirements of the Oregon state law:

"In order to register a person must have resided in the state of Oregon at least six months immediately preceding the application to register and must register in the precinct in which they have established a residence.

"Anyone who has voted at at least one election in this county in the past two years and has not changed his residence need not re-register.

"If you have moved since you last registered you will not be entitled to vote unless you re-register before October 8, in the precinct in which you now reside. Heretofore some people have returned, several years after having moved, and voted in the precinct where they formerly lived and were registered. The law does not permit anyone to vote in a precinct in which they do not reside and it is the duty of election boards to refuse to give anyone a ballot who does not reside in their precinct.

"Persons who will be absent from the county on election day may apply for an absent voter's ballot. The ballot voted in this manner must be voted and received in the county clerk's office not later than six days before the election. Ballots must reach the clerk's office not later than November 1 to be accepted for the general election."

TRIBUNE, KMED STRAIGHTEN NEWS ON RELATIONSHIP

In answer to a charge by the Medford Daily News that the transfer of KMED broadcasting from that paper to the Mail Tribune, announced on Monday last, was a "political deal," insisted upon by some unnamed local "candidate for high office," Ralph B. Gorton issued the following public statement today, emphatically denying the truth of the statement:

"To correct a misstatement regarding the recent change from the Medford Mail Tribune by Radio KMED, permit me to say that these negotiations were conducted in a conference between two representatives of the Medford Mail Tribune and myself. This arrangement was initiated by KMED and not by the Mail Tribune. There was no mention or thought of any political coup d'état and I wish to further state that KMED has and will always remain free from any political control or alliance. This change was effected as purely a business proposition and for no other reason.

(Signed) RALPH B. GORTON, Representing KMED. Medford, Sept. 30.

In today's News, the editor also made a retraction, by publishing a similar statement by Mr. Gorton. The new arrangement merely marks a resumption of news broadcasting between the Mail Tribune and KMED, which was carried on many years in the past, and will be conducted now and in the future, precisely as it was then.
