Some of the chief operators here are Californians, who are saving the producers of that

Extreme weakness is reflected all through the live chicken trade here with prices unchanged at the very low mark. Light hens are especially depressed here.

Sudden increase in the local churn of butter, and a very substantial ene. gave a larger output of butter here for the week today.

Trading in the egg market continues strong in practically all centiques strong in practically all centers. There was a well sustained market price here for the day and even the offering of undergrades by outsiders failed to check demand.

There is only a trille easier tone in the market for country killed caives, with sales still as high as 9e9% for selections. Hogs are steady but top lambs are very scarce. Mostly heavy she stuff coming.

There is a fractional cut in the price of peaches here with sales of Ribertas down to 22% box. Practically no local shock is now being offered.
