RESIDENTS FREE BURNING TOWN

Comment on the Day's News

HERE is a statement you may not even begin to believe, but it is at least interesting. It is taken from the September issue of the American Builder, published in Chicago, and representing the great building industry:

"Based on a survey of a thousand typical wage earners as to what they are going to buy when things are back to normal, the American Builder sees evidence of a present pent-up demand for three million new homes, valued at \$6000 each, a total of 18 billion dollars."

A ROSY ESTIMATE, to say the least, isn't it? And it certainly sounds overdrawn.

But it MIGHT be accurate. It might even be UNDER the facts.

SUPPOSE, for example, someone had said, back around 1910, that there was then a pent-up demand for THREE MILLION AUTOMOBILES.

He would have been hooted out of town, and his prediction would have been laughing stock every time a gathering of people got together for months afterward. Three million automobiles! The very idea! Why, there aren't that many cranks in the country!

So the comment would have run. But in the next 20 years, following 1910, more than TEN TIMES three million automobiles were manufactured and SOLD.

HERE is a statement that sounds rather startling, but it is essentially true:

In the light of modern invention and progress, the average dwelling of today is as out-of-date as was the horse and buggy back in 1910. It contains almost NO conveniences at all, as conveniences are going to be rated when people begin to become familiar with what the inventors have been turning out in the past three or four years.

Air conditioning alone, which is only one of MANY, MANY new developments, will revolutionize homes much as the self-starter revolutionized the automobile, making people want new homes who never thought of it before.

AIR CONDITIONING, as you probably know, will warm your house in winter, and cool it in summer. It will control humidity accurately, so that there will be neither too much nor too little moisture in the air you breathe—but just exactly enough for comfort and health.

It will wash the air that enters your house, just as the laundry washes your clothes, taking out all the dust and soot. With air conditioning, you will leave your windows closed tightly, yet will have perfect ventilation and perfect temperature control.

You can dust your furniture, and it will STAY DUSTED for an unbelievable length of time, because no dust and dirt will enter your house.

AND IF, for example, you are troubled with hay fever, you can retire to your home at the season when you are troubled and be wholly free from this scourge, for air conditioning will remove from the air that enters your house all the pollen that is the cause of hay fever.

And so on, indefinitely.

WHEN these new improvements become available at exceedingly reasonable prices, as they will shortly after business recovery sets in, people are going to become dissatisfied with their old houses and will want NEW ONES, just as people back at the beginning of this century began to be dissatisfied with their horses and buggies and wanted automobiles.

When people WANT THINGS badly enough in this country, they find a way to get them. They found a way, you know, to buy the twenty-odd million automobiles that are running on our highways today.

WHAT this new demand for homes will mean out in this country, where lumber, the finest of all building materials for small homes, is our principal manufactured product, can only be guessed at, but it will MEAN A LOT if the lumber industry is as shrewd at taking advantage of this new demand as it should be.

It MEANS greater lumber activity than we have ever seen before. Such a thing is possible.

25 FIRE FIGHTERS REACH SAFETY AS FLAMES CLOSE IN

One Dead, Two Towns in Ashes Result of Forest Conflagration On Coast—Million and Half Damage

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 4.—(AP)—Crushing in from all sides in a terrifying maelstrom of smoky flame and blasting heat, a forest fire today obliterated the town of Cochrane in the coast mountain timber country, about 50 miles west of Portland in Washington county. The loss including that in the town, to mills, railroad equipment and timber, is estimated by those in the area at more than \$2,000,000. The town's 200 inhabitants escaped.

The community and mill camp at Edwards, nearby, burned to the ground last night.

They raced with the flames as evacuating caravans pushed through the smoke to a haven beyond the swirling, blasting heat.

Property damage from the fire, which started last week, today had amounted to more than \$1,500,000. One man met death and two towns have been burned to ashes. Twenty-five men who were surrounded by fire last night, escaped safely this morning, making their way to an old burned spot, swept earlier by flames.

They had been unaccounted for more than 24 hours.

E. H. White was one of the last persons to leave Cochrane. From a vantage spot in the high room of the C. H. Wheeler Logging company store, he telephoned to Portland details of the conflagration.

Eat and Run.
"This is the last report you will get from me," he said, "as the roof of the store in which I am talking is burning and the fire is spreading fast. In a few minutes I will have to leave."

"The cook here is feeding 75 fire-fighters now. They are so hungry they are wolfing the beans and bread, hurrying to get their eating done before fire drives them out. The roof of their cook-house is in flames."

Fire today destroyed the Southern Pacific depot at Enright, and the Westwood Lumber company plant at Edwards.

S. P. Bridge Burns.
A \$100,000 Southern Pacific bridge was burned last night, and three tunnels in the line were burned out and another was expected to be destroyed. The town and mill camp at Edwards were burned to the ground last night and the fire was burning in the community of Enright today. A logger named Starr was killed yesterday when a tree fell on him in the Blue Lake district.

MEDFORD HEALTHIER SAYS SCHOOL NURSE

Definite signs of a healthier Medford were reported today by Mrs. Ruth Swanson Dodson, local school nurse. Physical examinations, which are nearing completion in the schools, show a marked improvement in student health, she said.

An absence of skin diseases is especially welcomed. Mrs. Dodson stated. She gave no reason for the improvement, but will release figures showing the decrease in illnesses as soon as all examinations have been completed.

FEDERAL COURT SESSION OPENED ON LIQUOR CASE

The Southern Oregon term of the federal court opened this afternoon with Federal Judge Alger F. Peck presiding. Judge Peck arrived yesterday afternoon, for the term, accompanied by Mrs. Peck, District Attorney George A. Neuner, his chief deputy, Charles E. Keane, and office stenographer, Miss McKay, arrived by train this morning.

The first case scheduled for hearing this afternoon are both for alleged violation of the liquor laws. They are the United States against Cliff Johnson and others, and Pat Hogue and others, for alleged operation of stills in Klamath county.

The case of Ivan Nealon against H. Van Hovenberg, orchardist of this section, is scheduled for tomorrow. This is a damage action for \$25,000 and is predicated upon an auto crash that occurred along the Klamath River highway in California last summer.

Nealon, a hitch-hiker, was riding in a truck that collided with the Van Hovenberg car. Nealon alleges in his complaint that he sustained injuries when the truck went over an embankment and he was pinned beneath it. He further alleges that hot water from the radiator scalded his leg. Van Hovenberg is represented by Attorney George M. Roberts of this city.

United States Marshal Jack Day and Mrs. Day and Chief Deputy William Graham and Mrs. Graham arrived this morning to attend the session.

Waters Elected Bonus Leader

HOOVER'S SPEECH IN CORN BELT TO BOOST CANDIDACY

Senator Dickinson Joins President's Party Enroute to Des Moines — Says Visit Will Aid Farm Vote

ON BOARD PRESIDENTIAL SPECIAL ENROUTE TO DES MOINES, AT DAVENPORT, Iowa, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Just before crossing the Mississippi river for the first time in the campaign, President Hoover today spoke of federal aid for the people along that great waterway.

At Rock Island, Ill., where he was greeted by a crowd estimated by police at 12,000, the chief executive asserted into a hastily erected microphone, that the moves for "full nine-foot transportation between Rock Island and other cities on the Mississippi river system cannot fail to advance prosperity of your city."

Three bands were playing as the train entered the city. There were applause and cheers as the president and first lady emerged. He leaned over the railing to shake hands with those nearest him.

Senator Dickinson (R., Iowa), who boarded the train at Chicago, and conferred with the president enroute, said the speech tonight would mark the beginning of a new phase in the campaign.

"Up to this point," Dickinson said, "the campaign trend has been to attack President Hoover's record. He has made such an outstanding record that the attacks will fall by the wayside."

"The next phase of the campaign will be attacks on the democratic program as unsound. This speech is the foundation for that program."

Dickinson also expressed the view that the president's speech would give the Republican cause a great boost in the farm area.

Shickley and reviewed briefly the accomplishments of the successful season experienced here last winter. He also explained the urgent need for subscribing to the local association at once as no memberships will be accepted after Saturday night, Oct. 8.

A. P. Johnson, chairman of the service club golf tournament made an interesting report on this local athletic activity and stated that six out of the nine trophies were won by the Rotary club in competition with the Kiwanis, Lions and Active clubs. KLAMATH BLAZES ALSO CONFESSED BY FRANK MILICK

Frank Milick, 20, a parolee inmate of the Arizona state hospital, arrested Sunday for setting fire last week to a Talent residence, and an Applegate barn, confessed last night, state police say, to setting fire a month ago to the White Pine Moulding company, and Ellingsen Lumber company warehouses in Klamath Falls. Milick, in his statement, the authorities say, further admits that he planned to set fire to the Palace Hotel in Grants Pass.

State police place credence in Milick's statement, inasmuch as he gave intimate details relative to the Klamath Falls blazes, and their location.

Milick is also suspected of setting fire in the northern part of the state. State police say that he is a parolee. He was first arrested here September 15, as a parole violator from the Arizona institution. That state refused to accept him, and he was discharged from local custody. At the time, Milick said he was going to return to Arizona.

State police investigators and insurance company aides are checking the activities of Milick, since his arrival in this state.

MEDFORD C. OF C. MAKES HIT WITH PORTLAND MEET

Southern Oregon Products Grace Table — Speakers Tell Progress and Problems—16 Make City Trip

Abandonment of ideas of state sectionalism and promotion of the prosperity of the entire state was the keynote of the program presented by the southern Oregon chambers of commerce before the members of the meeting of the Portland chamber yesterday noon, with I. E. Vining, Ashland, Frank Jenkins, Medford and R. C. Groesbeck, Klamath Falls as the principal speakers on the program. A. P. Johnson, chairman of the forum committee of the Medford chamber, presided at the meeting.

A luncheon composed chiefly of southern Oregon products awaited the 300 members of the Portland chamber when they arrived at the Hotel Multnomah for the meeting. Included in the menu were Medford pear pie, strawberries and grapes from Grants Pass, sweet potatoes from Roseburg, tomato juice from Ashland and potatoes from Klamath Falls. Grants Pass also sent 30 dozen gladioli for table decorations.

Stevens in Song.
W. W. R. May, chairman of the Portland chamber forum, opened the meeting, which was turned over to the southern Oregon chairman at 12:30, with the program from this district occupying the entire hour until adjournment. The first number on the program featured James Stevens, Medford baritone. Alma Lawrence, formerly of Medford, accompanied Mr. Stevens.

R. C. Groesbeck, president of the Klamath county chamber of commerce, was the first speaker, and covered the general business and economic situation in southern Oregon. He was followed by Frank Jenkins, whose topic was tourist travel, outlining possibilities for the development of tourist business in southern Oregon and emphasizing need for improved highways to handle the volume of traffic.

Tourist's Gateway.
Southern Oregon's growth ahead of that of the northern part of the state may be accounted for, in a measure at least, said Mr. Jenkins, "by the circumstance that we are the main tourist gateway to the state. By far the greater number of tourists who come to the state, come from the south. It is noticeable, too, that only about 40 per cent of them get as far north as Roseburg, the remainder spending their entire vacations in the southern part of the state. The inference is that southern Oregon intrigues them; that they find locations and opportunities to satisfy them without going further north, and they either stay there as permanent residents or come back later to make their homes."

Vining Tells River Need.
I. E. Vining, of Ashland, closed the program for southern Oregon with an address devoted to game and wild life conditions in southern Oregon, with particular emphasis on the necessity of making Rogue river a sportsman's stream and closing it to commercial fishing. "In the long run," he stated, "the sportsman's dollars attracted to the Rogue river country will return to the state a profit vastly greater than that which may be realized from any commercial fishing activity on the stream, which is limited, even under best conditions."

Included in the Medford delegation, headed by W. B. Bolger, president of the Medford chamber of commerce, were J. C. Thompson, A. P. Johnson, O. O. Alenderfer, James Stevens, R. R. Reter, W. H. Fluhrer, T. E. Daniels and Frank Jenkins. Ashland was represented by G. M. Green, Mayor E. J. Thornton, Lou Hansen and I. E. Vining; Klamath Falls by R. C. Groesbeck and Earl Reynolds; Roseburg by George Smith and W. C. Harding. Grants Pass did not send a delegation to the meeting.

Roosevelt an Apostle Of Despair Says Mills

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Charging Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt with refusing to discuss "major issues" the campaign on his recent visit to California, Secretary of the Treasury Ogden L. Mills said today he would take up the tariff question in detail in his San Francisco address Friday night.

Secretary Mills, here to deliver an address before the American Bankers' association tonight, was the principal speaker at a Republican rally last night at Tully auditorium that attracted a crowd estimated by Republican leaders to have been in excess of 5000. The crowd overflowed the building and clogged the streets around it. A loud-speaking system carried his address to those unable to obtain seats.

Picturing Roosevelt, the Democratic nominee for President, as "an apostle of despair who practically admits the depression has him licked before he starts," Secretary Mills described President Hoover as "a tried and seasoned veteran of magnificent courage and resourcefulness." He was given prolonged applause and cheers. The cabinet official was introduced by Joseph B. Scott, Los Angeles attorney, who nominated President Hoover at the Chicago convention. Scott introduced Mills as the President's "strong right arm."

"On the one hand," Mills declared, "there is inexperience, vague promises, utter failure to come to grips with the real problems, and a philosophy which cannot be described as other than a philosophy of despair."

FEAR PROPAGANDA MAY WRECK PLAN FOR EMPLOYMENT

Fear that propaganda against the Siskiyou road recruiting will wreck the labor prospects and relief program of Jackson county for the coming winter and next spring, was expressed today among the unemployed, county officials, and welfare agencies. In Gold Hill, where the building of the super-road would furnish probably employment for a full crew in the Portland-Beaver cement plant, disapproval of the agitation was voiced.

The federal government, in its unemployment relief program proposes to spend in Jackson and Josephine counties, the coming winter and next spring, \$455,000 of federal funds. The misleading report that this would be derived from local taxation and sale of state bonds, has caused the false impression to go forth over the state that Jackson county does not want the money. This immediately resulted in Multnomah and other upstate counties taking steps to get it. Petitions were circulated and letters written to the governor, urging an abandonment of the recruiting plan on the ground "it would boost the taxes."

In an effort to offset the activities of the opponents of the road work, the county court yesterday addressed the following explanatory letter to Governor Meier:

"The opposition of a few citizens to the construction of a new highway from the California line over the Siskiyou, is not representative of the attitude of the people of this county. The citizens signing a 'Taxpayers' League' composed only a small number of the residents living along the course of the old highway, and the reasons stated by them in their various communications to you and to the highway board are purely personal."

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MEXICO ORDERS PAPAL DELEGATE OUT OF COUNTRY

Chamber of Deputies Calls On President to Oust Monsignor Flores — Viewpoint Called Imbecile

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 4.—(AP)—President Rodriguez today dictated an order expelling Monsignor Leopoldo Ruiz y Flores, the papal delegate from Mexico.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 4.—(AP)—The chamber of deputies decided to call upon President Rodriguez today and demand the expulsion from Mexico of the papal delegate, Monsignor Leopoldo Ruiz y Flores, because of the recent encyclical of Pope Pius XI on Mexican church affairs.

The decision followed an animated session in the chamber last night. It was proposed by Luis Leon, editor of El Nacional, organ of the revolutionary party, who bitterly denounced the Catholic clergy.

"I propose that we go in a body," he said, "and inform the executive that, in obedience to our revolutionary convictions, we are ready to combat in any way, our eternal foe." The resolution was approved by acclamation.

Senor Leon referred to the church's viewpoint as "imbecile" and "treason." He said the Mexican clergy always had been the ally of the conservatives, the land-owners and the wealthy, but never of the humble classes. They opposed the constitution of 1857, he said, and sought an emperor prior to Emperor Maximilian's "invasion" of Mexico.

Fifty members of the Medford post attended the installation ceremony of the Ashland post No. 14, American Legion, in the Lithia city last night. Ray Jehu, new district commander, was present from Coquille, and installed the new officers.

Grants Pass was also represented at the installation, and the dance and supper which followed. Commander Hussey of Kerby was present and invited the Ashland, Medford and Grants Pass Legionnaires and their wives to attend the Kerby installation Wednesday of this week.

John Enders was toastmaster for the evening, and Paul McDonald, department first vice-commander, gave an outline of the results of the state and national conventions held in Portland.

Voicing appreciation of the fine attendance from Medford, the Ashland post promised to turn out in full force at the Medford installation meeting next Monday evening at the K. P. hall.
