

ASHLAND NORMAL POINTS FOR TILT WITH JENNE CREW

SOUTHERN OREGON NORMAL SCHOOL, ASHLAND, Oct. 4.—(Special)—With the game with Pacific University two weeks away Coach Howard Hobson is today ready to begin preparing for Miss Jenne's crew after his team who had not been conceded a chance, rose to great heights as they overcame a six-point lead, forged ahead, and then were finally tied 12 to 12 in a last quarter rally by the California Aggies at Sacramento Saturday.

Hobson's warriors literally played the favored farmer boys off their feet during most of the contest and after Cliff McLean, shifty Indian safety, returned an Aggie punt 75 yards for a touchdown it was only a matter of minutes until a spectacular passing attack with Hines sending long spirals into Sapp's waiting arms put the ball in position for Hines to pass again, this time to Captain Balkovic who shifted out from tackle, until a second score had been chalked up.

It was not until the final quarter that the Aggies were able to even the score. The Sons made their big stand in the third canto after the score at the half had stood 6-0 with the farmers ahead. As the effect of the first game began to make itself felt the Aggies hammered away until the tiring Hobson outfit finally yielded the last touchdown. "Swede" Anderson, big guard, was one of the stars for the Ashland team. His defensive play was outstanding as he broke thru time after time to throw Aggie backs for losses. While the whole line functioned in good fashion it was Anderson and Mahoney, the little 150-pound center, who tore at the Aggie defense most consistently.

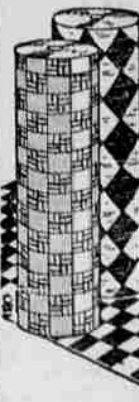

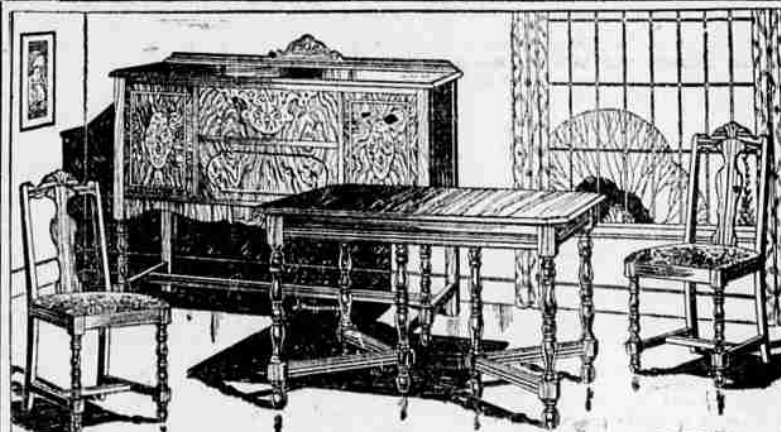

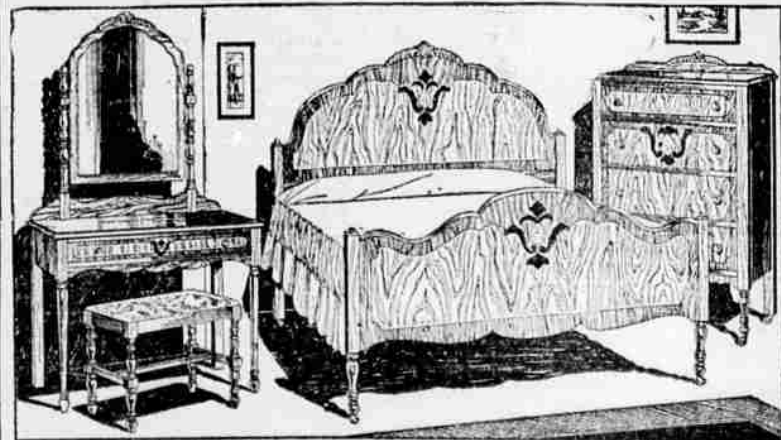
