and not in any manner indicative of the attitude of the majority of the people. The results set forth in opposition to the new road, viz: increasing the tax burden, etc., etc., are wholly misleading.

"The present status of the unemployment situation here, the county's future relief needs, and the general welfare of the people of Jackson County conclusively indicate the need for the new highway, and the work it will bring.

"Therefore, we earnestly solicit your cooperation and assistance in this matter, and cannot stress too strongly the nature of the elements injected in opposition to this new road, as being entirely misleading."

The letter was signed by the entire county court.

A final decision on the matter is expected within the next day or two.

According to County Judge C. B. Lankin and other members of the county court, many of the service station operators, and property owners along the old road, are opposed to the improvement.
