

# Medford Tigers Trim Roseburg 14 to 0 Despite Illness of Stars

## LINDLEY, GHELARDI STAR FOR LOCALS IN SLOW CONTEST

Medford Line Holds Firm Throughout—Burgheer Squad Under Wraps—Galinski Makes Long Run.

With a backfield composed of second string men, throughout the greater portion of the game, the Medford high school football squad defeated Roseburg high 14 to 0 on Van Scoyoc field Saturday. Tommy White, Fichtner, and Scheel were out of the game with mild attacks of flu. Coach Burgheer played under wraps with a down Klamath Falls scout in the stands.

The all-around playing of Lindley at end, and the flashy open field running of "Caldwell" Ghelardi were features of an otherwise slow and rugged game marked by frequent substitutions. The ball was in Roseburg's territory most of the game. The Medford line held like a stone wall, and broke through frequently to smother Roseburg plays before they started.

Lindley during the course of the afternoon recovered two Roseburg fumbles, and played a heady game. Galinski, until taken out early in the third quarter, made several spectacular gains, including a 50-yard run for a touchdown. The first touchdown was a pass Ghelardi to Bennett.

Ghelardi, a mite of a player, made a couple of long returns of punts broken fumbles. Medford scored a third touchdown on a buck by Thurman, but the play was pronounced illegal because Ghelardi failed to take time out for a substitution.

Medford in the final quarter broke through the Roseburg line, and flopped Collins for a touchdown. Tigers Threaten Near End. The game ended with the ball in Medford's possession in the shadow of Roseburg's goal. The line-up:

The heavy Grants Pass team held the Klamath squad safe throughout most of the game through superior line play. The Klamath Falls team kicked precision in its plays. Once they carried the ball to the three-yard line, where they were held for downs.

Grants Pass scored its first touchdown on a completed forward pass, and run of 20 yards. The second score came in the final quarter on an intercepted forward pass, and long run. Fredericks, a huge tackle, and McGuire, an end, played sensational ball for Grants Pass. The Josephine county squad showed plenty of power in the line, and a world of improvement in the past two weeks. Klamath Falls rated them as a "valley set-up."

OREGON BATTLES WASHINGTON TO SCORELESS TIE. (Continued from Page One) The first quarter drive that saw the Huskies march from their own 34-yard line to Oregon's 21 ended at that stripe when Burt Bufkin was held for no gain on the last down. Washington had one yard to go for a first down and Johnny Chierberg called upon Bufkin but the latter met a stone wall at the center of the line and Temple kicked out of danger for Oregon.

Kostka Needed Coach "Prink" Callison was without the services of his sensational sophomore halfback, Stan Kostka, who suffered a dislocated shoulder in practice Wednesday and none will ever know whether he could have carried the Webfoots to victory had he been able to play. Matt Muczynski, Washington's brilliant sophomore halfback, was suffering a "Charley Horse" in his left leg and he played only a part of the first period. With the big lad out of the tussel and Chierberg badly bumped in the initial quarter to terminate his endeavors, Phelan elected to use his second and third string backs during most of the remaining time.

In the dying seconds of the battle both teams resorted to wild passes in a desperate effort to score and they took turns intercepting the aerial shots with no harm done on either side. Statistically the Huskies had an edge. They put together 118 yards gained from scrimmage and 36 from passes for a total of 154 yards, compared with Oregon's 63 yards on the ground and 10 in the air for 73.

Washington made eight first downs and Oregon five. Webfoot booters averaged 31.6 yards per kick, compared with 29.5 for the Huskies. A kicked three times for five yard penalties, Oregon was set back 15 yards, while Washington was penalized twice, five yards each time. Taking to the air nine times, the Webfoots completed two passes and had three intercepted. The visitors tried six, three of which were good, two knocked down and one intercepted.

Members were present from all parts of the county, also most of all of the local candidates.

The meeting showed that the Republicans of this county are awake to the situation, that confronts the people of the nation and the necessity for the re-election of President Hoover and the Republican ticket, and are going to put on an active campaign.
