

MYSTERIES OF EAST INDIA TO BE EXPLAINED

Famous British Author to Speak Here Oct. 22—To Tell Yogi Philosophy, Relate Adventures Far East

An Englishman who became a Yogi, Major Yeats-Brown, formerly of the British Army in India, will disclose some of his unique and unusual experiences in the Orient when he speaks here under the auspices of the University club in Medford, Saturday, Oct. 22 at the high school auditorium. Major Yeats-Brown is on a visit to this country, including Hollywood where a part of the film of his book, "The Lives of a Bengal Lancer" was made. Most of the film was made in India on the scene of the happenings of the story and was made by Schoedessack, the famous photographer who made "Cross" and "Chang."

Speaks on Mysticism of East

It will be interesting to have one who embraced fully the mysticism of the East discuss this phenomenon frankly with an audience made up of devotees of the materialistic West but Major Yeats-Brown can do it. And he points out that we might have gone deeply and successfully into things of the spirit as we have into material things, had we from the beginning devoted ourselves as continuously and devotedly to it. And that is something for us to think about at least.

There is nothing of the mysterious about the major. He is an adventurer of the first water. He has lived two lives; that of an officer in his regiment, one of the crack outfits of the British Indian army. As such he was a first rate soldier, suave and cool, a veteran campaigner, engaged in fights in Turkey during the World war, in the wilds of the Afghan border and wherever else duty called him. He was a first rate polo player and a great hand at the characteristic sport of pig sticking. He was an Englishman of Englishmen, an officer and a gentleman.

Decided to Find Out

And then he decided to find out what this thing called "Yogi" is. And he did a thing that very few Englishmen will do. He put on native dress and lived among the people; he studied Indian mysticism at first hand—no Cook's tour route for him. He went about as a native disciple does, with a loin cloth, dressed as we see Gandhi in his famous pictures, and with a humble demeanor he sought out learned gurus and sat at their feet among the other pupils. He wandered the length of India as a native pilgrim seeking the mysterious depths of truth. He learned well and became a full fledged yogi, one of the very few men of the Western world to achieve that mystical distinction.

Major Yeats-Brown travelled tens of thousands of miles up and down that mysterious sub-continent. He bathed in the Pool of Eternal Life at Cape Cornorin, the southeast tip of tropical Hindustan. He frequently made the long pilgrimage to Benares and other sacred cities of the Ganges and the Jumna to discuss questions of religion with Brahmin pundits and questions of philosophy with Brahmans. He whose disciples regard him as one of the custodians of the wisdom of the ages. He paid his respects to the Fish-Eyed Goddess, and along with tens of thousands of pilgrims, he helped pull the mammoth Car of Juggernaut on its two mile journey. And now he will appear here and

CHARGE FOREIGN BANKERS TRYING TO BEAT HOOVER

NEW YORK CITY, Oct. 14.—That international and European bankers are manipulating the American stock market to bring about the defeat of President Hoover was a charge emanating from Republican headquarters today.

For some time it has been a puzzle

to Wall Street why with car loadings on the increase, steel orders growing and commodity prices gradually improving the stock market should be so sluggish, and there should be a drop after each of President Hoover's speeches.

It is claimed the stock drops here, have been due to a flood of selling orders from Europe, the day following the president's speeches. It is also claimed that European bankers want President Hoover defeated because they believe the election of Roosevelt will mean a lowering of protective tariff duties, opening of America, the richest market in the world, to European manufacturers and farmers.

This it is argued, would immediately improve the financial situation abroad, and render economic recovery there more rapid.

Although democratic leaders ridicule such a charge, there have been a number of Wall Street reports which confirm it. Sentiment on the

street is strongly agreed that the dumping of securities by foreign holders has been a determining factor in recent stock market declines, and explains the inability of the market to regain a tone which actual improvement in American business would justify.

It is declared to be probable that before election, an investigation by the department of commerce into the unloading of securities from abroad since the presidential campaign started will be made, and the findings given to the American people.
