

# Ashland Normal and Pacific U. Gridders Clash Here Tomorrow

### EVENLY MATCHED SQUADS OPPOSED IN OPENING GAME

#### Coaches Hope for Dry Field for Fast Play—Sons Line Averages 183 Lbs. and Badgers 181—Game at 2

**SOUTHERN OREGON NORMAL SCHOOL, Ashland, Oct. 14.—(Sp.)**—Two great football teams are today anxiously awaiting the opening whistle which sends Pacific university against the Southern Oregon Normal in Medford at 2 p. m. tomorrow on Van Scoyoc field in Southern Oregon's first exhibition of college football this year.

Both the Sons and the Badgers are in fine condition and on edge for the classic battle which will mark the meeting of the two elevens at practically even odds. In case the rain clouds which have been threatening for the last 48 hours let rain fall, neither outfit will have any appreciable advantage from play on a wet field.

Coach Howard Hobson of the Sons and Coach Eldon Jenne of the Badgers hope for a dry field so that their preferred Warner system of "razzle-dazzle" formations will work to the best advantage.

**Fast Game Expected**

If Jupiter Pluvius is in a kindly mood and puts his rain can away until after the game, Southern Oregon fans should be in for some of the most sensational football ever flashed on the local gridiron. Passes, reverses, spins and dashing runs by fast, deceptive ball-toters make up the characteristic offenses of both aggregations should provide a full hour of thrills for a near-capacity crowd if the field is not sloppy.

Interesting delights on the game are that it marks the debut of Hobson's machine in the season as well as the first clash between football teams of the two schools. Hobson and Jenne will oppose each other as mentors for the first time since Jenne left Washington high in the Portland interscholastic loop, where his teams vied with those from Benson Tech tutored by Hobson.

Two more evenly matched teams never stood face to face at a kickoff. The Sons' line will average right close to 183 pounds while the Badgers will hit a mean at 181 pounds to the man. The backfields, while not so close in weight, appear to be about the same on paper, at least. Hobson's starting backs average 176 pounds while those of Jenne hit at 168, but what the Badgers lack in weight is made up in speed and the finished execution of the tricky formations used by Jenne offset the difference of a few pounds. In addition, the Pacific backfield is made up of seasoned veterans in every position while Hobson will have three new men and one letterman, the flashy negro, Claude Hines.

**Reserves Must Wait**

The last minute onslaught made on first string positions by the reserves in scrimmage sessions all week may mean that some of them are likely to see action before the game is over, but it is probable that Hobson will use his most experienced performers at the beginning. The Teachers' lineup will likely be practically the same as the one which opened against California Aggies in Sacramento two weeks ago with the fast coming reserves being held ready to go into the fray at the first sign of any weakening.

Hobson will use big Frank Sapp, 190, former all-Northwest conference star, at one end and either Elton Fornbrook, 170, or Bob Patterson at the other wing post. Patterson is a letterman of the same poundage as Fornbrook but the latter played the Aggie game while Patterson was kept out with a crippled ankle so he may get in call in spite of the great comeback made by Patterson this week. Sapp is Hobson's crack pass receiver and does most of the punting. Willard Jones and Curt Beckham are the reserves.

**Balkovic Is Giant**

Balkovic, veteran and former Oregon freshman star, will star at tackle. He weighs close to the 200 mark. His running mate will be Harvey Oakes, who stands six feet four and tips the beam at 210. Oakes was a Portland all-star for Benson Tech last year. Lee McConnell, 170, and Ross Carter, 195, will be ready to go in the game should the need for more tackle strength arise.

"Swede" Anderson, Medford's spectacular lineman, will start at guard. Anderson is a veteran for the Sons and a former Oregon Fresh. He weighs 193 and is one of the most outstanding defensive men ever to play in a Sons' forward wall. Dwight Patterson, two-year veteran, appears to have a slight edge at the other guard assignment, although he has been given a hectic battle for starting honors by Ross Green and Earl Hankins. Patterson will go into the game at 170, while Green weighs 170 and Hankins only 161.

Con Mahoney, little 150-pound center, will start the game and Medford fans are in for some fine examples of brilliant defensive play if the scrappy little Irishman functions against the Badgers as he did in Sacramento. Mahoney made quite a name for himself in the south after giving his opponent a 30-pound advantage and then drove him ragged, breaking through to smother the Aggie backs behind the line of scrimmage. Lyle Jones, 190, is the alternate at the pivot post.

**Hines to Start**

In the backfield will be Claude Hines, 170, colored passing ace and speedy ball carrier, at quarterback. Tommy McKittrick, triple-threat halfback, will get the call. He is a shifty runner of 185 pounds who does a large share of the ball carrying on running plays. The other halfback will be Cliff McLean, elusive Indian safety man, who puts many a thrill

The starting guards will be Eldon and Cone, 185, and Sam Nixon, 170. Both are lettermen and tough men, according to reports.

Captain Arthur Brackmann, three-year veteran of 200 pounds, will open at one tackle and Ray Berney, 220, at the other. Berney was formerly named on the all-Northwest team.

A pair of 160-pound ends, David Bruce and Clement Farberry, will start the contest. Bruce is the only starter in the line who is not an experienced college campaigner.

Jenne's big backfield threat is the versatile and famous Al Weinel, who runs, passes and kicks with equal ability and forms the backbone of the Jenne crew, and Dennis Holland, 165, a good blocker.

The Badgers boast another triple-threat back in Ray Critchfield, 180-pound two-year veteran, who is one of the shining lights at quarter. Wilbur Rusonick, sensation for Oregon City high school last year, and Blake Johnson, another letterman, help Critchfield with the signal-calling duties.

Portland officials, all members of the state association, will be on hand to supervise the game tomorrow. They are: Douglas Lowell, referee; George Mimsaugh, U. M. P. I. R. E., and Lynn Jones, head linesman. Mimsaugh and Jones are ex-University of Oregon backfield luminaries who played under Capt. John J. McEwan.
