

## SONS WHITEWASH PACIFIC 20 TO 0 ON LOCAL FIELD

Visitors Hope To Save First String For Coming Tilt With Whitman Proves Mistake—Anderson Stars

A savage attack directed effectively in all departments of the game by the Southern Oregon Normal eleven swept a hopelessly outclassed Pacific University football team before it here yesterday while Coach Howard Hobson's outfit made its home appearance by winning 20 to nothing in a thrilling exhibition.

While a great line functioned in fine style Powell Lancaster and Claude Hines' Sons backfield eleven slashed and tore through the Badger defense for long gains time after time.

Rain fell in a downpour throughout much of the third period and both teams resorted to a kicking game in which Lancaster had a decided edge.

Regulars Called  
Until the fourth quarter Eidon Jenne, Pacific coach, used his reserves while his regulars sat on the bench saving themselves for the Badgers' important conference battle with Whitman next week, but even with his strongest men in the game the advantage did not change.

The one time that Pacific had the Sons in a bad way came in the second period when Critchfield's kick was grounded by Pargery on the teachers' one-yard marker. On the next play Lancaster was forced to punt from behind his own goal line but he got off a beautiful spiral which soared and rolled 80 yards to the Pacific 19, where Sapp downed Critchfield before he could get away.

Hines Scores  
Hines made the first score just a few plays after Lancaster had made his sensational 80-yard boot and Critchfield was taking a chance to cross up the Sons' defense by throwing passes deep in his own territory.

After Oakes recovered Killitt's fumble McKittick who had gone in Lancaster's position made four yards in two attempts to put the ball on the Pacific 25. Hines added five more running and then two incomplete throws gave Pacific the ball on their own 15-yard line. The Badgers failed to make yardage and the ball reverted to the Sons. Jones then took a short pass from Hines and drove past tackle to put backs for the last score of the game.

Line Holds Well  
Hobson's line was at its best defensively and needs a little polish before it will reach its maximum efficiency on offense. On defense "Swede" Anderson, the great Medford linebacker was a tower of strength. The big blond guard played the entire time without a headgear and was through the Pacific line practically all the time, either making the tackles or smearing up the interference.

Other standouts in the Sons' line were big Frank Sapp, who performed brilliantly on the receiving end of many of Hines' passes and who would be down on Lancaster's kicks to stop the Pacific safety before he could get started on the return. Little Con Mahoney, fire-eating midget center, was another shining light on defense.

The Sons piled up 153 yards from scrimmage to 68 for the visitors and made up 11 first downs to the Badgers' six.
