

HOG BURNER FOR CITY HALL LEFT UP TO COMMITTEE

Council Grants Women's Clubs Quarters - J'ville Road Fencing Pondered - Tax Paying Starts.

Plans for the installation of a hog fuel burner in the city hall were considered again last night by the Medford council at the first meeting of the body in the hall on North Central, recently taken over by the city, following removal of county officials to the new courthouse. H. B. Riley of the Combustion Engineering company, appeared before the council to suggest that the city purchase a burner while engineers are here to make installation, thereby avoiding the extra expense of the transportation of men and machinery from Portland to Medford.

Following extensive discussion, favorable to the action, the matter was referred to the building and finance committee, members of which were instructed to inform the city council as soon as they arrive at a decision. A special meeting of the city dads will then be called.

Seventeen burners are being installed in Medford, Mr. Riley stated, among the most recent being the system at the Junior high school. Advantages of the hog fuel burner for heating, particularly in Oregon, were presented by Mr. Riley and by several members of the city council. In addition to providing heat at less expense, the system would enable the using of a local instead of a California product, it was pointed out, and of a saving which will be the first year amount to a sufficient sum to finance installation of the new system, Mr. Riley stated. The burner installed at the present time will cost \$975.

Mrs. Rose Scheffelin, Mrs. G. R. Satchwell and Mrs. Edwina Weishaar appeared before the city council again last night in the interests of local women's clubs, which were granted the use of two rooms adjoining the former circuit court room in the city hall, as club headquarters. The contract, which provides for a three-year lease to the space, improvements and furnishing of which will be financed by the clubs, was read and approved by the council. Mrs. Scheffelin thanked the city dads for their cooperation and explained the plans of the club women to convert the space into attractive quarters to be used by all interested women's clubs of the city. They will pay rent of \$15 a month for the space.

The report of the council committee, regarding the matter, was made by Councilman G. A. Meeker. The old Jacksonville railroad question, which has been a bad penny in the lives of city councils for a series of years, returned again last night in a communication from L. M. Lofland, asking that the city fence the railroad right-of-way, through which cattle are entering and damaging his property. The complaint was referred to Councilman George Porter and City Superintendent Fred Scheffel, who were instructed to seek a solution to the problem if they had to go out and build a fence.

Request from the library committee for the appointment of J. C. Collins to the city library board was read and approved. Resolution, asking the county court make a levy for the Medford roads for the year 1933, was passed by the council and a plan for enabling the city police to switch off the lights from their new location accepted.

City Attorney Frank Farrell reported that in at least 20 cases local property owners, who agreed to pay their back taxes under the installment plan, have met their first payments.
