MUNICH, Bavaria, Oct. 18. - (AP) - Maurice Dornier, who designed the great flying boat Do-X, with his brother Claude, died today. He made the first transatlantic flight in the Do-X, through all her mishaps and adventures, reaching New York in August, 1931.

BRITISH ABROGATE RUSSIAN PACT IN PROSPERITY MOVE

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 19. (AP) - J. H. Thomas, secretary for dominions, announced in the house of commons today that Great Britain has abrogated its commercial treaty with Soviet Russia. Under article 21 of the tariff agreement reached at the recent Ottawa imperial conference, he said, renunciation of the temporary commercial agreement with Russia was made necessary. This agreement was signed in 1930. It gave Russia the privilege of most-favored-nation treatment and therefore, Mr. Thomas explained, it stands in the way of trade prohibitions which might be necessitated by the obligations undertaken at Ottawa. Thomas moved the first of the finance resolutions which will make the Ottawa pact a part of the law of the land. Declaring that his purpose was to indicate the real significance and importance of the Ottawa conference, he said that if that meeting results in increasing the prosperity of the British empire, it would be the best contribution Great Britain could make toward restoration of world prosperity.
