

JIMMY FOXX WINS VALUABLE PLAYER AWARD FOR YEAR

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—(AP)—A committee of the Baseball Writers' association of America has designated Jimmie Fox of the Athletics as the American league's most valuable player in 1932, thereby turning this year's major league selections into an all-Philadelphia affair.

Fox, who led the Athletics to a 73-point out of a possible 80 to win the American league award by a decisive margin from Lou Gehrig of the Yankees, who received 53 points.

Chuck Klein of the Phillies was announced yesterday as the committee's choice as the National league's most valuable player, beating out Lonnie Warneke of the Cubs and Frank O'Doul of the Dodgers. Announcement of both winners was made by J. Roy Stockton of St. Louis, chairman of the selection committee in each league.

Fox's winning total was made up of five first choices, one second and two thirds. Gehrig was picked for second place by a 14-point margin over Heinie Manush of the Senators, fourth with 37; Lefty Gomez fifth with 27, and Joe Cronin, Senators, and Babe Ruth, Yankees, tied for sixth with 26.

Fox enjoyed his most spectacular season in the campaign just closed. He was named out for the league batting championship in the closing days of the season by Dale Alexander of the Red Sox, but eluded 58 home runs, only two behind Ruth's all-time record, led both leagues in runs batted in with 127 and compiled a batting average of .364.

CHUCK KLEIN OF PHILLIES NAMED NATIONAL LEAGUE MVP

CHICAGO, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Banning the radio from the American league baseball parks next season will come up for serious consideration at the annual meeting in December, President William Harridge indicated today.

There is a growing sentiment, President Harridge said, against the broadcasting of baseball games. The eastern half of the league is solidly opposed to the radio, three of the clubs—Philadelphia, New York and Washington—even forbid telegraphic reports to be filed out of the park for broadcasting purposes.

The decision of the major leagues to extend the 1933 season a week longer means that the world series will start about October 4 with the regular season concluding on October 1st.

STERLING SLUMPS

LONDON, Oct. 19.—(AP)—A sharp fall of sterling dollar quotations from \$3.41 yesterday to \$3.36, featured foreign exchange quotations this morning. The fall was attributed to seasonal movement and speculative selling of sterling on continental accounts. It was understood the market that official support was not yet functioning through the exchange equalization account.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Oct. 19.—(AP) Adherence to the animal trainer's law—never to yield an inch—was credited by Terrill Jacobs today with saving his life in an encounter with four African leopards.

Jacobs, 28, preparing bears, lions, tigers and leopards for a vaudeville tour, escaped with deep scalp wounds. Without gun or whip, he went into an enclosed training area.

The leopards were surly.

At his command, each jumped to a pedestal high above the sawdust rings and he stood below.

Jacobs heard a snarl behind him and a leopard leaped. Claws tore his scalp and leather jacket. The other leopards bared their teeth, jumped down and approached him.

The trainer grasped the 130-pound animal behind the neck, and threw it across the ring. Blood from his wounds craned the beast, but Jacobs knew one step backward probably would mean death.

He snapped commands. The leopards cowered, turned and crawled into their cages.

A physician took eight stitches in the trainer's scalp.

INJURIES LESSEN HUSKIES CHANCES

SEATTLE, Oct. 19.—(AP)—With two of their backfield axes considered out of the starting lineup because of injuries, the University of Washington Huskies will likely seek victory through the air when they meet the University of California Bears here next Saturday in a Pacific coast conference football game.

Johnny Cherberg, quarterback and Matt Mucynski, right halfback, have donned their uniforms again but are taking only light work. Cherberg bruised a hip in the Oregon-Washington scoreless tussle and Mucynski suffered a "charley horse" in his left leg in the Montana contest.

Abe Ahonen, the best forward passer on the Washington squad is being groomed to replace Mucynski, indicating that Coach Jimmy Phelan will seek aerial touchdowns. Although only a sophomore, Ahonen will carry the brunt of the Husky attack. He also will do the kicking while in the frays.

ARIZMENDI MAULS NEWSBOY BROWN FLYWEIGHT BATTLE

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 19.—(AP)—Alberto Arizmendi is still the featherweight champion of the world in California, so far as Dave Montrose, alias Newsboy Brown, is concerned. Displaying all the speed and agility of his Aztec ancestry, along with the fire which warms the Spanish blood in his veins, the brown idol of old Mexico and little Mexico alike, decisively whipped his Los Angeles Jewish opponent here last night before 7,000 persons.

Only in one round could Brown, who boasted a previous win over Arizmendi, muster up the necessary fight to hold his own. Except for a brief lull during the middle of the fight, the lad from Mexico City, who recently was awarded the world's title so far as the California commission is concerned, won all the way.

He started out by forcing Brown to lead, counter-punching to the head with lightning quickness as he saw his openings and whipped over rights and lefts. Arizmendi warmed to the task thoroughly in the third when he all but floored his opponent with a looping left and then battered away with Brown helplessly clinging to the ropes.

Came the lull when the Los Angeles battler regained his equilibrium slightly to sharpshoot with his left in characteristic fashion to win the sixth. The eighth also was fairly even, but in the ninth Arizmendi took the fight into his own hands, making his own opening with a body-bruising attack. Again he forced Brown to the ropes with his wild rushes and maintained the withering pace through the tenth.

STATE TEAM AIMS TO HALT COUGARS AERIAL ATTACKS

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 19.—(AP)—Washington State's habit of transforming a football into a Zeppelin and sending it on long non-stop flights from the hands of George Sander to the eager fingers of some Cougar receiver will meet with all the discouragement Oregon State can give when the two teams meet here Saturday in a Pacific Coast conference game.

Coach Paul J. Schlaser was giving his Orangemen an intensive course today in how to be successful obstructors to aerial navigation. The freshman squad was drafted to keep the ball in the air after the Cougar plan and the efforts of varsity were concentrated in breaking up such attack. Woody Joelin, rookie assigned to emulate the Cougar passing threat, Sander, proved a successful enough understudy yesterday to enable his teammates to collect considerable yardage against the varsity.

Vic Curtin, center, injured in an automobile accident Sunday, and Curly Miller, tackle, with a mild attack of lumbago, were missing from the lineup today, but both are expected to be in shape for Saturday's game. Miller will be acting captain for the occasion, Coach Schlaser announced. He names a different captain for each game.

ESPEE FREIGHT TO COOS BAY REDUCED

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 19.—(AP)—The Southern Pacific railroad today was authorized by the public utilities commission to establish and maintain class rates between Coos Bay and Portland to conform to water and truck rates. The change in rates between these two points would mean a reduction of about 24 per cent from existing rates.

Application for such an order was requested by the railroad firm and supported by citizens of the Coos Bay district. The class rates to be established may also change these rates to conform to competitive rates when the latter makes changes.

The principal traffic involved in this order is general merchandise moving in less than carload lots.

LA GRANDE BANK CLOSES; NO LOSS

LA GRANDE, Ore., Oct. 19.—(AP)—The First National bank of LaGrande did not open its doors for business today. It was announced that the bank, the only one in this city, was closed for voluntary liquidation.

The bank, faced with shrinkages of deposits the last few months, coupled with low prices of commodities that made collection of accounts impossible in some cases, felt that voluntary liquidation would best protect the interests of all concerned. The directors said they expected no one would lose any part of his deposits through liquidation.

No further statement was expected until tomorrow. A representative of the comptroller of currency is en route to LaGrande to take charge of the bank.

SALEM, Oct. 19.—(AP)—The Mitchell State bank in Wheeler county was turned over to the state banking department today. A. A. Schramm, superintendent of state banks, announced. The bank did not open this morning.

The institution was organized in 1918 with a capital stock of \$25,000. Deposits were about \$50,000. L. L. Jones is president and Fred Anderson, cashier.
