

GRANTS PASS IN HIGH FEVER FOR TILT SATURDAY

Players Express Confidence Of Victory — Fitchner Out With Influenza For Local Crucial Contest.

The Grants Pass high school football team, enthused by an upset victory over Klamath Falls, now has the conference championship bug, and is coming to Medford next Saturday with the avowed intention of giving the Burghermasters a drubbing on Van Scoop field.

The Medford team, without the services of Clyde Fichtner, Scheel still out of commission, and a bad case of "gittitis" raging in one mainstay, will complete its drilling for the game tonight. One of the biggest crowds of the year is expected to see the battle.

The Grants Pass paper prints an editorial on the game and the Grants Pass players have the following to say, according to the same source:

"Here's what Coach Beer has to say about Saturday's game: 'The boys should be just about in their prime by Saturday. I don't want to make any predictions, but we look for a hard game and Medford will know they have played some football when we get through. The boys are in good spirits and that's a great thing for a winning team to possess.'"

"And here's what some of the players think about it:

"Fredericks, the terrible guard on the local squad, says: 'Believe me, it looks bad for the Tigers.'"

"McGuire, the elusive ball carrier: 'I've waited three years for this game and now it's not going to slip through my fingers. We're going to win.'"

"Strack, the man-mauling quarterback: 'It'll be a tough game, but we'll bring home the bacon.'"

"Cook, the boy with the punting foot: 'We're going out to win.'"

"Neely, what-a-man: 'The Tigers'll have to eat a lot of raw meat to stop us.'"

"Palmer, watch out for him: 'We sure hate to make it tough for Mr. Burgher.'"

"Hamilton, the big triple-threat: 'Neris! We'll win; that's all.'"

"Wyatt, the boy with the brains: 'We're going to give them everything we've got.'"

"With a spirit like that, the boys ought to have plenty of fight and a good delegation to the southern metropolis will certainly spur them on to a glorious win."

SEATTLE WONDER BESTED BY NEGRO

SEATTLE, Oct. 20. — (AP) — The sensational climb of Frank Van Hee, Seattle heavyweight, in Pacific northwest fight circles, was halted here last night by "Dynamite" Jackson, when the big Los Angeles negro scored a technical knockout in the sixth and final round. Jackson scaled 207½ pounds and Van Hee 202.

Fighting only a year, Van Hee had molded together quite a record in the northwest, winning virtually all of his battles and chalking up eight knockouts in his last eight bouts. Jackson cracked the Seattle boy with a left to the chin that sent him to the floor for a three count in the first and walloped Van Hee again in the sixth for a nine-count. When Frank came up wobbly in the last canto Jackson whaled him with rights and lefts and the referee stopped the match a second before the going.

Sammy Santos, Seattle Filipino junior welterweight, continued a recent knockout spree by dropping Young Battling Nelson, Walls Walls, in the third round of their scheduled six round bout.

Bobby Gray, San Jose featherweight, was awarded the decision over Louis Nelson, Portland, in six rounds, and Jack Kracken, Norway heavyweight, knocked out Sam Eisman, Tacoma, in the third round of the four-round opener.

COPILOS VICTOR IN SIXTH BLOCK

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20. — (AP) — Gus Copulos, Eugene, Ore., won the sixth block of his 600-point match with Jay Roseman, Vallejo, 36 to 30 in 54 innings here last night but Roseman continued to hold a total lead of 300 to 253 in 258 innings.

In the fifth block, played late yesterday, Roseman took the match lead as he scored 50 points to Copulos' 10. Roseman also broke his own world record by making 150 points in 100 innings of play.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 20. — (AP) — Patrick Kelly, Boston heavyweight wrestler, defeated Wallace Muscovich, Poland, two out of three falls here last night. Kelly punched his way to victory, taking the final fall with some hefty rights to the jaw. Kelly won the first fall in 10 minutes 42 seconds, with flying head scissors. Muscovich evened the count in nine minutes, 36 seconds, with a series of body elms. Kelly took the third fall with a series of right haymakers, in three minutes, two seconds.

MONTREAL, Oct. 20. — (AP) — Five dogs were sentenced to death here today for attacking a horse when it was down.

The horse stumbled and fell yesterday and dogs set upon it. An officer shot the horse and then condemned the dogs to death.

SENTIMENT GROWS TO RETAIN STAGG

CHICAGO, Oct. 20. — (AP) — Sentiment to keep Amos Alonzo Stagg as head football coach at University of Chicago grew today.

Although Thomas Nelson Metcalf, named as Stagg's successor as director of athletics effective June 30, refused to discuss the coaching situation, several close friends of the veteran coach believed he would continue to direct Chicago's football forces.

One of them, James Weber Linn, professor of English at Chicago, said he was certain Stagg would be reappointed.

Stagg himself refuses to discuss the possibilities of his retention, except to remark:

"It's a little early for them (meaning the freshmen who have started a campaign to keep him as coach) to start worrying."

OREGON SHY STARS MOTORS TO IDAHO

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 20. — (AP) — Oregon's football squad, 27 strong, will leave at 4:30 p. m. today for Pullman, where they will remain until Saturday morning, when they will motor to Moscow for their game with University of Idaho. The team will be minus the services of Captain Bill Morgan and Mike Mikulak, both being so badly crippled they will not make the Idaho trip. Oregon, following its sensational defeat by University of Southern California at Los Angeles last Saturday is not taking the Idaho game lightly. If the Vandals should overcome Oregon, Coach Frank Callison is determined it will not be via the aerial route.

HOME LOANS FOR OREGON IN WEEK

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 20. — (AP) — Within not more than two weeks, and probably within a week, the Federal Home Loan bank of Portland will be prepared to lend money.

This statement was made today by Frank S. McWilliams, chairman of the 11th district board, who reached Portland yesterday to confer with directors of the Portland bank and to arrange details incident to establishment of permanent headquarters of the institution.

Loans will be available as soon as the organization of the board is completed, McWilliams said. The Portland bank will handle loan applications from Oregon, Washington, Montana, Idaho, Utah, Wyoming and Alaska.

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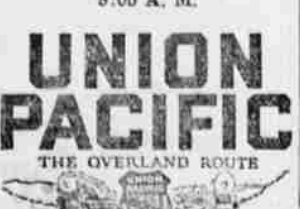

OREGON STATE TO FACE COUGARS IN BEST OF CONDITION

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 20. — (AP) — An Oregon State team in its best condition will romp onto Bell field here Saturday afternoon to face the Washington State Cougars in their Pacific Coast conference football encounter.

The Orangemen were idle last week-end, and the two weeks' interim since their last game, with University of Southern California, has seen all injured players fully recovered. The only man still on the sick list today was Tar Schwammel, tackle, with a slight case of influenza, and he is expected to be in shape for the contest with the team that turned back California.

Loren Tuttle, out since he dislocated his right shoulder in the Gonzaga game a month ago, was back in uniform today and Coach Paul J. Schiesler intimated he will be in the starting lineup at right guard.

Schiesler has not disclosed the full opening lineup, although he said today Keith Davis will be in at end and will handle the punting. Everett Davis will have the other wing berth; Pangle will call signals from half or fullback position, and Curly Miller at right tackle will be field captain.

The Oregon State rooks and the Oregon University frosh will meet in a preliminary game.

TROY COACH SEES WIN FOR STANFORD IN TILT SATURDAY

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 20. — (AP) — Coach Howard Jones scratched his head today and wondered if his Trojans of Southern California are as much weaker than the national championship aggregation of a year ago as comparative scores this season show, or whether it is a simple matter of their football opponents being stronger.

Troy's head man thinks his question probably will be answered Saturday when his team clashes with Stanford at Palo Alto in the game which also may decide the Pacific Coast conference championship.

"We've looked pretty good, defensively," Jones admitted, "but the boys certainly haven't clicked offensively. I wouldn't say they have failed to do the best they know how, but whether this is going to be good enough against Warner's team Saturday is the problem I want answered."

"Stanford seems to have fewer plays than in recent years but far better execution. Of course, the Indians may have more plays than I know about. Warner also has more and better reserve material to call upon, regardless of what he and some other coaches I know say about all the material being in my possession."

"I understand Pop's backfield has failed to wait a sufficient length of time after the shift on a number of occasions this fall, so I may have all the officials hold stop watches on his team. Being an opponent of the illegal shift, I know he will be willing."

"It really looks as though Stanford should win, but I have an idea it will be quite a ball game."

All of which was something of a long speech for one so taciturn as Troy's head man.

Southern California has not been scored upon in four games, although the team's opponents chalked up 25 first downs and completed 13 passes. The significant thing is that eight of these forward flips were made by Utah in the first game of the year. A team Troy had not scouted.

Coach Jones will take 38 players north tonight, stopping at Castlewood Country club, near San Jose. The squad will work out lightly Friday and move to Palo Alto Saturday morning.
