RELIEF COMMITTEE OF GOVERNOR MAKE COMMISSARY PLAN

Negotiations to be made with local farmers by the governor's relief committee to obtain stock for the central relief commissary in Medford, were discussed yesterday afternoon at the relief meeting held at the county courthouse.

All farmers of the valley who have a surplus of basic products, are asked to get in touch, through letters or personal calls, with the members of the county court, Victor Tengwald, secretary of the court, in reporting on the problem, yesterday stressed the necessity for diversified products in the commissary stock, before the plan can be satisfactorily operated.

The farmers are asked to let the court know what they have and what their lowest prices on products will be. The committee is anxious to buy products from local farmers first, it was pointed out.

The housing problem was discussed by C. E. Gates and Harry Turner and the possibility and advisability of using the fairgrounds, construction and other buildings, considered. Money to be brought in by the county by the Slokey and Central Point highway projects was also listed in the general plan to relieve unemployment.

Attending the meeting were Judge C. B. Lamkin, Commissioners Victor Bursell and John Barnsbury, Miss Lillian Roberts of the Red Cross, Mrs. A. E. Reanca, head of the women's division of the governor's relief committee.

ROOSEVELT LEADS AS HOOVER GAINS IN DIGEST VOTE

The last returns of the Literary Digest straw poll, released today show no material change in the general standing.

Roosevelt still leads, beating Hoover about 3 to 2 in the popular vote. Outside of some of the larger cities, where the president is strong, Hoover only holds the lead over his Democratic opponent in New England, which if he holds that lead would give him 57 electoral votes. In New York, however, he is gaining, as well as in Illinois, while in Oregon Roosevelt is beating the president to date, over two to one.

This is generally regarded by impartial political observers in this state as far from the true picture of the situation. Even the Democrats concede Hoover has been gaining rapidly throughout the state, particularly in the rural districts, and that Roosevelt will have to poll a tremendous majority in Portland, where his strength is centered—seven to defeat Hoover on November 8th.

Even the strongest supporters of the president agree that as far as this poll goes—and it has been an accurate barometer in the past—the democratic nominee and his party to date have all the best of it.

PAIR ARRESTED AS DRUNKEN DRIVERS

Arrested a mile this side of the Klamath Junction, about 1:30 this morning, following a collision, Earl A. Brown, 37, driver of one of the cars, and his companion, Carmen L. Evans, are expected to be taken into court today in Ashland.
