COMMON MISCONCEPTIONS OF THE BILE.

In primitive physiology the bile was one of the four humors and the ancients called it choler and ascribed to it irascibility.

To this day the term choleric means hot-tempered, passionate, irascible, fiery disposition, readily excited to anger.

A healthy adult secretes from 1 to 1 1/2 pints of bile daily. The bile or gall is a yellow or golden-brown liquid, containing green in herbivora, fifty-five in man. It is alkaline, viscid, sterile (germ free) and somewhat antiseptic.

AGED WATCHMAN IS CONFESSOR BOND HOUSE BLASTING

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Oct. 24.—(AP)—A heavy home-made bomb shattered the interior of the Logan and Bryan office building at Plaza and Third streets here at 5 o'clock today.

After a welcome yesterday and an automobile trip to Warm Springs, Ga., where he spends as much time as possible in the invigorating waters, the governor tackled the address scheduled for Atlanta tonight and for Baltimore tomorrow evening.

It was the first night he had spent of his special train since he started from Albany last Tuesday.

On his arrival in Atlanta in the morning, he told the smiling, shouting crowd, "I'm not going to talk politics because it's Sunday, and anyway I don't have to talk politics in Georgia."

Ahead of the governor today were a motor trip around the city, parade, conferences with democratic leaders assembled here, the address at 9:15 p. m., C. S. T. at the Atlanta auditorium and finally departure at 10:30 p. m. for Baltimore by way of Raleigh and Richmond where brief stops are planned.

Senators Byrnes of South Carolina and Pittman of Nevada are traveling with the Roosevelt party, the former planning to stump Delaware, New Jersey and Rhode Island in behalf of the Roosevelt candidacy.
