Harold Lloyd Big Hit at Craterian. It's been two years since Harold Lloyd last treated his fans to one of his films. That's a long time to wait for a Lloyd picture, and yet, as "Movie Crazy," with Constance Cummings, the film to break the long silence, arrived itself yesterday before a howling, ruffing audience in the Craterian theater, it seemed that a Lloyd picture is worth waiting two years or even more to see.

To say that "Movie Crazy" is the best picture Lloyd has ever produced sounds like the utmost extravagance. Yet the soberest consideration points to the conclusion. It has a good, consistent story, a strong supporting cast, and Lloyd himself tops every previous characterization. Something has happened to the comedian in the last two years. He is a subtler, more mature, and generally better actor, and gives the impression that he is really carrying a story by the force of his personality even if it were not gagged to the hilt with mirth-provoking situations.
