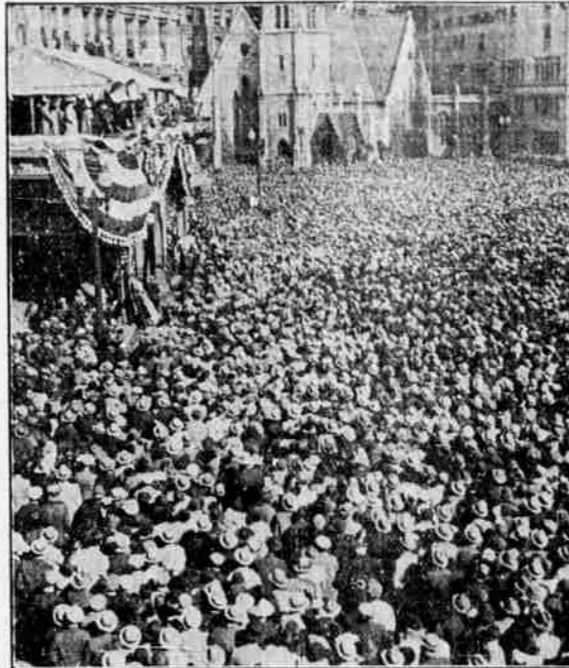

## ROOSEVELT BESET BY SORE THROAT ON DIXIE JOURNEY

North Carolina and Virginia Support Certain—Rain Mars Raleigh Stop—Scores Hoover and Dixie.

ABOARD ROOSEVELT SPECIAL ENROUTE TO BALTIMORE, Oct. 25.—(AP)—His voice so hoarse that he spoke with difficulty, Governor Roosevelt today made his first appearance of the campaign in North Carolina, greeting big crowds that gathered along the route of his special train.

Whereas: The Jackson County chapter of the American Red Cross, through discontinuance of Community Chest support, is not financially in a position to carry out its emergency relief activities in Jackson county.  
And Whereas: It is therefore necessary that the Red Cross raise funds to carry on said activities through voluntary contribution; as absolutely no funds from any other source are available for this purpose; from the public funds in the treasury of Jackson county, Oregon, or otherwise:  
Therefore: It is the opinion of this court, and it is hereby resolved that funds must be raised through voluntary contribution and subscription in order that the Jackson county chapter of the American Red Cross in its forthcoming drive for funds to carry on its absolutely indispensable and invaluable relief activities; which otherwise must necessarily cease and cooperative work of a relief nature with this court, which work is absolutely indispensable; could not be continued.

At Southern Pines, the governor appeared on the rear platform to the accompaniment of cheers and shouts of greetings.  
Conspicuous in the crowd was a sign which read "friends of Roosevelt and repeal."  
"About the only thing I lost down in Georgia is my voice," said the governor, smiling broadly.  
"I am confident of the result on November 8 and even more confident of the result in the state of North Carolina."  
That brought another big cheer and yells of "you're right, Roosevelt."

Despite a thin drizzle of rain, Raleigh, capital of the state and home of former Secretary Daniels, poured out a crowd which covered the expanse of tracks opposite the state fair grounds about four miles out of the city. Hundreds of automobiles were parked in the grounds nearby.  
James Roosevelt told of the reception at all hours of the night and early morning, which had been accorded the governor throughout the United States. As the governor spoke, the crowd stood in a clammy mist that seemed as if it might change into a steady rain at any moment and thus break the weather record that Mr. Roosevelt has set so far. Since he left Albany more than a month ago on his first western trip, no meeting has been broken by rain and there have been few times when he has not had sunny skies.

The governor left Atlanta last night after a two day visit culminating in a mass meeting which packed the city's big auditorium to the rafters and hundreds of others clamored in vain for admittance.  
In this first address delivered in the heart of the south by a democratic presidential nominee in many years, Governor Roosevelt repeated his pledges for aid for the farmer through easing the farm mortgage situation and raising agricultural prices by a tariff benefit.  
Secretary Hyde as well as President Hoover served as the target of pointed paragraphs. "I believe that we owe it to the farmers of America to have as secretary of agriculture an agricultural leader instead of a political leader," he said.  
In this connection an open boom for "Cotton Ed" Smith, veteran senator from South Carolina, for the post of secretary of agriculture in the event of democratic success was launched by a delegation from his state at the conferences today.
