## HIGH WINDS ADD TO FIRE HAZARDS, LIFE LOSS SOUTH

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Strong winds, some of a velocity estimated at 50 miles an hour, were blamed today for the death of a boy, thousands of dollars in property damage and indirectly led to the death of a man engaged in a search for two hikers who escaped from a brush fire which periled their lives.

Felix Moreno, 10, of Ontario, received fatal injuries when he was swept from a sidewalk by a gust of wind into the path of an automobile.

Charles White, 40, of Arcadia, engaged in a search for P. R. Lundy, Jr., Monrovia banker, and Lloyd Nelson, Arcadia school teacher, was killed in a 150-foot fall to the bottom of a canyon.

Nelson and Lundy, with Ott Hershey Arcadia banker, and Vernon Dodge, Arcadia merchant, began an ascent of the rugged mountain Sunday, but Dodge and Hershey returned after proceeding three miles up the slopes. When their companions failed to appear later, a search was organized. Lundy was found uninjured but Nelson had slipped down the same canyon in which White later was killed, and had suffered injuries. The two men were located by an airplane pilot who sighted their signal fire. Reports to sheriff's deputies said the fire was fanned into a dangerous blaze by the wind and for a time it was feared that the hikers might have been caught in their own fire, but they eluded it and were brought down the slope by the rescue party.

Brush fires were spread in several other districts by the flames, including a blaze near Trumfo, where 30 men were recruited to fight the flames. A church, six residences and several garages were damaged by the wind in Los Angeles, several small buildings were demolished in Ontario, Glendale and the Las Cresenta valley. Telephone lines were crippled and hundreds of signs were blown down. Orchards suffered slight damage.
