

# STRAW VOTES OF 'TIDINGS' REVEALS POP, HERB, HIGH

## Gates Even In Pipes Strong-hold, and Wilkins Last—Jennings Popular, Briggs Strong.

The Ashland Tidings yesterday published its first count of its straw ballots, and showed:

C. E. (Pop) Gates and A. W. Pipes, county judge, running neck-and-neck. Pipes is the candidate of the Tidings. Gates has no newspaper support in that city, and has made no intensive canvass, so the extent of his Ashland strength came as a welcome surprise to his supporters. Fehl received 27 votes and Phipps 25. Approximately 250 ballots were voted, and represent a cross-section of the south end of the county.

Attorney M. O. Wilkins of Ashland, independent candidate for district attorney, received 10 votes. William Briggs, attacked by Wilkins in speeches, and an Ashland resident, received 170, and Coddling 45.

In the sheriff race, Beeson received 115, and Jennings, ten more than Zundell and Schemmerhorn, independent and Democratic aspirants, together.

The county-wide drift for Hoover, since last spring, was shown in the presidential choices: Hoover, 134; Roosevelt, 65; Thomas, 11.

In the Ashland district, if the Daily Tidings straw vote ballot is any criterion by which the November returns may be judged, President Hoover will lead Roosevelt by a two to one vote; A. W. Pipes will run a neck-and-neck with C. E. (Pop) Gates for an Ashland majority in the Ashland district, while Briggs will likely poll a three to one vote over George Coddling for district attorney, and Beeson will have a walkaway in a majority for the sheriff job.

Sentiment seems to be crystallized against the Zorn-MacPherson measure, while the outstanding surprise of the ballots cast was the fact that 103 voted for the repeal of the Oregon dry laws, while but 95 voted against the repeal.

The ballots were counted this afternoon, more than 200 having been cast during the first week the ballot box has been in this office. Many of the ballots revealed votes for Hoover, a county judge candidate and against the school bill and for or against the repeal of the Oregon dry laws, but many of the ballots were not completely filled out. The name of Ralph Jennings was written in on 85 ballots, while Judge Norton received quite a number of votes for county judge.

Another counting of these ballots will not be made until next Saturday, or possible Monday, and everyone in Ashland who has not voted is requested to do so this week.

M. O. Wilkins, independent candidate for district attorney, polled 10 votes. Earl Fehl, the Republican candidate for county judge, polled 27 votes, while Phipps, Democratic candidate for the office, polled 25, indications being one of the two independent candidates will make the grade in this district, with two votes difference between Pipes and Gates, it being uncertain which one will take final honors.

The vote for the repeal of the Oregon dry law was the big surprise of the count. This Oregon dry law repeal, it was expected, would be "snowed under" in Ashland with the community always outstandingly dry—but the repeal vote ran neck and neck with the dry vote and in the end the repeal vote was in the majority.

# MERCHANTS MAKE FIRST PLANS FOR CHRISTMAS CHEER

An enthusiastic meeting of the retail trade division of the chamber of commerce was held last night at the Hotel Medford, attended by about 30 local merchants who developed preliminary plans for the annual Christmas opening, which will be held on Saturday, November 26th, and committees to supervise the various events of the opening were appointed by John Moffatt, president of the merchants' group.

A window decorating contest will provide one of the feature events of the opening, according to plans outlined last night, with a committee consisting of C. A. Meeker, Elmer Wilson and L. F. Andrea in charge of the event. It is expected that all retail establishments in the city will participate, and some exceptionally attractive Christmas window displays are anticipated. Features for the evening's program will be under the direction of a committee consisting of B. J. Trowbridge, chairman; E. T. Burelion and H. J. Field.

A brand new system of street and store-front decoration will be worked out by the decorating committee selected last night, with Jack Wurts as chairman, assisted by R. B. Strang and Klieh Pennell. Designs for street decoration submitted to the meeting by Mr. Wurts were approved by the merchants present, and the committee was instructed to proceed with plans for the decoration of the entire business district.

A publicity program to precede the event will be under the direction of Herb Grey and E. L. Scott, and steps will be taken to insure that all residents of the Medford trade area are informed of the details of the opening event beforehand. A plan for inaugurating a "shop early" campaign was presented to the meeting by C. L. MacDonald, local manager of Foster & Kleiser.

Austin B. Fenger of San Francisco, told the retailers of some of the plans for stimulating Christmas business used in other communities on the Pacific coast, commending particularly the system used by the merchants association of Hollywood, and indicated that the plans used there were most productive, and perhaps the most comprehensive of any city on the coast.
