

Trojans Expect Hard Game with California Team

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 27.—University of Southern California's coach staff, to the man, feels that their football team will have greater difficulty coping with California here a week from Saturday than it did with Stanford last week-end.

While the fact that the Trojans have been deprived of their greatest offensive threat as well as a strong safety man in Orville Mohler, who was benched because of spinal injuries, is partially responsible for the attitude the season the Bears have made as the progress rolled along is given as one reason for the opinion.

"I have seen California the past three weeks," said Aubrey Devine, S. C. scout, "and the Bears have shown improvement each time. Defensively, California is better than Stanford. Offensively the team is just as powerful as Stanford but not as versatile."

Coach Howard Jones had this to say: "If you remember, the start of the year I said that California would be our toughest Pacific coast opponent. I have seen nothing to change this opinion, not even California's defeat. The loss of Mohler means that we will have a harder job than ever. It is impossible to tell how much his loss will hurt us."

Jones intends to scout California in its game with Nevada Saturday, as the Trojans will not be employed in a gridiron way this week-end.

SKEETS MANERUD HANDLE WHISTLE IN PELICAN TILT

Approaching the mid-season with only two injuries, Coach Burghier's Tigers have sharpened and polished their claws and will be ready to rip the Pelicans to shreds Saturday, in the biggest battle of the year for both squads.

In 1931, Medford defeated Klamath by a 6-7 score. This year the teams of both schools are noticeably stronger on account of each team having many veterans still in uniform—Klamath having lost only three or four by graduation and injuries, of whom Hammaker is the chief one with a broken collar bone, and Medford losing five or six by graduation.

The line has not been announced because of injury. Hannebeck will undoubtedly start at center, with Grim and Grieves driving from their positions at guard. Minear and Shaw, betty tackles, will fill the line at their same positions. Lindsey and Bennett will mow the interference runners down from the ends.

Gilinsky, a broken field runner, will start at quarter, with one half filled in by Knips or Scheel. Tommy White will probably be playing at the other back, despite an injured hand received in the Grants Pass game.

Skeets Manerud, Eugene, will act as referee, with L. D. Deal of Grants Pass as umpire. The head linesman will be Young of Ashland. Although the Bengals have many tricks in the bag, Coach Burghier

stated that the prospects of winning the game were as yet undecided. The Klamath Falls News has the following to say about the Pelican lineup:

"Les Avritt, immediately forgetting the Corvallis victory so as to drop the possibilities of too much confidence, started work this week to build his team for the most important contest of the season.

"Eugene Barrows, halfback, and Jack Knight, end, two of the most outstanding crannies, probably will be in lineup. Both, however, will have a difficult time replacing the reserves who played so admirably against the Corvallis team.

"It isn't likely Knight, out since the first of the season, will be far enough along to check over Lynn Propat's job at end. Propat, star of the Corvallis game, has turned into one of the best wingmen the Pelicans have ever had.

"Barrows will fight it out with Wayne Perry for the blocking back job.

"Nello Giovanni, recently released from the hospital, will probably start at one tackle, and Clemmon Sigford at the other. Giovanni suffered an infected leg.

"Johnny Fastiga and Gaylord Hayes look like the starters at guard, and Don Bradley at center.

"The backfield combination undoubtedly will include either Norman Taber or Wilfred Schulzire, fullbacks; Lewis McAninch, quarterback, and Bill Mayhew, Chester Jones, Eugene Barrows and Wayne Perry, halfbacks.

"The record of Klamath's games with Medford isn't available, but the Tiger assertion of an unstained record has not gone without dispute. Pelican historians recall one victory and one tie against the valley team."
