Who's Looney Now?

THE present status of the presidential campaign recalls a remark made by the late Lord Bryce:

"During the height of a presidential campaign (in America) it is doubtful if anyone remains quite sane. It has been my observation that those who most emphatically deny emotional instability, are often those who are most plainly victims of the prevailing psychosis."

Lord Bryce was the author of the most penetrating and authentic analysis of American politics ever written, and what he found true nearly a generation ago, is undoubtedly true today.

NO one is quite sane, and the people of this country, as a whole, we fear, will not return to sanity until after the 8th of November.

So we must expect to find such evidences of irrational celebration as continue to provide amusement for those who are able to retain, both their sense and their sense of humor.

The recently accepted organ of Roosevelt support in Jackson county brands the endorsement of President Hoover by Governor Meier, "as political propaganda of the most vicious type, endorsement of a cause that has brought ruin and disaster, and if successful, will mean "a complete breakdown of the present order of things, bloodshed will stalk through the land, communism, that most dread reaction to special privilege, will gain impetus, and there will be retributions on a scale never dreamed of."

And leading this incendiary outburst is the declaration, THAT FEAR IS THE MOST DEVASTATING OF ALL INSTRUMENTALITIES THAT CAN BE INJECTED INTO A POLITICAL CAMPAIGN!

When such statements can be made, by the same newspaper, side by side, what is any rational observer of the present political scene to conclude? WHAT comment can be made, MORE effective than the raising of both hands, a shaking of the head, and no comment at all!

AND until Mr. Richard Washburn Child, the apostle of sweetness and light in this campaign, who so bitterly execrated the Republican leaders, as "guilty of fabricated treason, playing shipwreck politics, advocating a policy of rule or ruin," when they dared to maintain that a repudiation of the Hoover program at this time, would retard rather than hasten economic recovery, SPEAKS OUT AND ALSO DEPLORES THIS DEMOCRATIC PROPOGANDA as well, only one conclusion can be drawn.

When such a plea aids Roosevelt it is right and proper, when it aids President Hoover it is unworthy and WRONG!

Stand by Oregon

BLITHE AND CAREFREE THE LIFE OF A TAPEWORM.

The common tapeworm is the beef tapeworm, called Tenia saginata. This parasite seldom causes serious trouble in the human host, but in some instances digestive disturbance and simple anemia may occur. The life cycle of the tapeworm is passed as follows: The larva is present in the meat in little spots no larger than a raisin seed. Such spots are called "measles," or cysticerci, or bladder worms or hydatids—all meaning the same thing, a watery vesicle. Examined under magnification the "bladder worm" appears to be the head (not larger than the head of a pin) and neck of the tapeworm with a little watery sac attached.

The "measly" meat is eaten raw or underdone (thorough cooking of the meat would kill the larvae) and in the stomach or intestine of man the larva develops into the adult tapeworm. The head is equipped with no hooks such as some other tapeworms have, and hence it is not difficult to expel the worm. The worm grows in links or segments, very small at the head end, increasing in size, until they become flat oblong yellowish links as large as a pumpkin seed. The entire tapeworm may reach a length of many feet. Pieces consisting of one or several links or segments are occasionally discharged. The finding of these unmistakable segments or the finding of the tapeworm eggs by microscopic examination, is the only positive evidence that an individual has a tapeworm.

Contrary to popular belief a tapeworm does not rob its human host of any appreciable amount of nourishment, nor does emaciation or weakness of the host indicate that he has tapeworm. Indeed, most persons who are found harboring tapeworm are too well nourished. Voracious appetite is of course not at all suggestive of the presence of such a tapeworm.

The eggs of the tapeworm discharged from the intestine of the host contaminate the ground or perhaps the feed or pasturage of cattle, or possibly their water supply. The microscopic eggs are ingested by the cattle develop into larvae in the stomach of the animal and penetrate the stomach walls and lodge in the muscles, also in the liver, heart and brains. Their presence seems to give the bovine host no trouble as a rule.

No treatment for tapeworm infestation is advisable or even safe without the personal supervision of your physician.

Such "measly" meat may occasionally pass the regular government inspection in the great packing houses, and probably not infrequently gets into the market in communities where locally produced beef is sold directly to the retailer and the public without official inspection. However, it is a minor matter, provided one makes it a rule to avoid eating underdone or rare beef unless there is adequate assurance that the meat is free from bladder worms.

Beef kept in cold storage or in pickle for 21 days may be considered safe in any case, as bladder worms or cysticerci die within that time.

BRITISH JOBLESS ON HUNGER HIKE AND POLICE MIX

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 27.—(AP)—Rioting unemployed, shouting defiance at the police, participated today in the most serious disturbance of the kind that London has seen in years.

Fifty thousand people were massed in Hyde Park and at the several entrances a column of several thousand jobless marched in for a demonstration in protest against administration of the dole system.

In great Cumberland palace, opposite the marble arch entrance on Edgeware road, a brick was thrown through the postoffice window.

Mounted police charged, swinging their clubs and the mob fell back, cursing and booing.

The police retreating and the crowd swept in again among them. Time after time the horses pressed back the mob, withdrew, and the mob surged in again.

Stones and mud whizzed past the policemen's heads. Several persons were injured and taken away in ambulances.

This fighting took place over a 300-yard section along the bridge path from the marble arch westward. Meantime the throng inside, which had been listening in an orderly manner to speeches from 50 soap-box orators, became menacing.

Armed by the affray at the marble arch, mobs began to gather inside the park railings.

The mounted police extended their charges along Bayswater road as the crowds before and behind them grew more hostile.

The rioters pulled branches from the trees and tore up the park railings with weapons. They threw anything that came to hand.

One mounted policeman was separated from his galloping squad. His helmet was knocked off by a stone. There were women screaming among the rioters. Some of them fainted and were carried into stores.

Dozens of windows were broken and as darkness fell there was no sign of a truce.

While this was going on, a number of elderly gentlemen who lead their dogs through Hyde Park every afternoon were out as usual for their daily exercise.
