LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 28.—(AP)—Some sports enthusiasts use rabbits' feet for luck, but in Kentucky, voodoo incantations have entered football. Three afternoons this week, six huge negroes, garbed in long white robes and carrying a black coffin, performed weird ceremony on the University of Kentucky playing field.

The voodoo priests conducted mystic rites near the goal posts, designed to bewitch the goals so Alabama players will be unable to cross them Saturday. The coffin, piled high with flowers, contained the "Alabama Jinx."

Kentucky has been unable to defeat Alabama since 1922. The rites also are intended to cast a spell over the jinx and keep it inside the coffin until after Saturday's game.

PARENTHOOD MAY REST ON SCIENCE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Future improvement of the human race may depend upon regulation of its own evolution by saying who shall be fathers and mothers.

So Dr. Walter F. Wilcox of Cornell university reported to the American Public Health association today. He said medical progress "gradually eliminates the influence of natural selection, that is, selection by the premature death of the unadapted, or what has been called lethal selection," and added:

"If progress is not to be checked or turned backward it would seem that society must develop other forms of selection, like selection for marriage or for parenthood, to play the role filled by lethal selection in uncivilized or semi-civilized groups."

GIRL'S KIND HEART WINS 'THANK-YOU'

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—(AP)—The kind heart of little Mary Ann Joy of Brooklyn has won for her an official thank-you note from the state department.

Mary read that American delegates to the Geneva disarmament conference lived in an attic on a rug and with a loud speaker their only other bit of furniture.

In a letter to the Brooklyn Eagle forwarded to the state department, Mary put a dollar to start a fund so "Uncle Sam's representatives in Geneva may win peace for the world." "Tomorrow or next day, Mary will receive on the dignified stationery of the department, a gracious thank-you for her solicitude; her dollar back and the friendly notice the delegates aren't living in a garret."
