high school straw ballot only high school students, the Christian Church straw ballot only members of that organization, so this straw ballot ONLY REPRESENTS the readers of The Mail Tribune.

The interesting thing to the straw ballot editor, however, is the close resemblance between all these ballots—the same winners in each instance, except for county judge. In the Ashland Tidings Pipes, its own candidate, led Gates by four votes, whereas in all the others Gates won hands down.

As stated when this contest was started The Mail Tribune holds no brief for straw ballots. They are, at best, mere "straws in the wind"—indications, NOT demonstrations of what political sentiment really is. lots, gives the former a credibility not usually attained.

As far as public interest and participation are concerned, this year's straw ballot set a new high record for all time. Nearly 1600 votes were cast and after the final count was made today, the ballots continued to stream in.

The straw ballot editor makes no claim the results represent an accurate cross-section of political sentiment in Jackson county. He does believe it shows who the winners will be in Medford on November 8—Hoover, Gates, Coddling and Beeson.

(although if the Jennings movement gains impetus, he admits the possibility of error in the sheriff contest). He does claim—in fact he knows—that the straw ballot was conducted absolutely on the square, that every effort was made to prevent repeating or stuffing, that special requests for everyone to vote, regardless of their preferences, were frequently made—and if supporters of Fehl, Phipps, Pipes, Wilkins and Zundel did not vote—it was their fault, not the fault of this paper.

So there you are. The straw ballot contest is over. "Put up your money and take your choice."
