

COUNCIL DELAYS BUDGET MEETING TO COMING WEEK

Session Hears Plan to Rent Space in Old City Hall—Bond Sale Voted—Firemen to Stay in Limits

A short session of the city council was held last night, at which time recommendations to volunteer firemen, selling of bonds to a Portland firm, and reports of various committees were heard. The city budget meeting, scheduled to follow the council session, was postponed until sometime next week.

L. O. Schaefer, who operates a shop for repairing electrical motors, appeared before the council and asked to rent the space in the old city hall formerly occupied by the police and the city jail, for the sum of \$20 per month, with a five-year lease, and all alterations to be made at his own expense.

Up to Scheffel. Curtis Darty read the recommendation of the committee concerning the rental, which stated the space was to be rented at \$25 per month, with a one-year lease to be granted. The council voted to turn the matter over to City Superintendent Fred Scheffel, with power to act. The council also voted on offering for sale city bonds amounting to about \$22,000, to the investment firm of Smith, Camp & Riley, Portland.

The matter of protection for volunteer firemen called outside of the city limits was brought before the group again, and it was pointed out that no insurance, in case of injury, was carried for the men, outside of the city. Such protection would cost the city \$14.40 more per month, on insurance.

Firemen to Stay Home. The body voted to instruct Fire Chief Roy Elliott not to use volunteers at fire outside of Medford, and to inform the volunteers at their next meeting of the action taken by the council.

Recorder Mose Alford read a letter received from the state fire association, recommending that no gas tanks of a capacity over 1000 gallons be allowed inside of the city, and Mayor E. M. Wilson suggested that the matter be considered.

Mr. Alford was instructed to seek permission from the county assessor to delay filing of the assessment lists.

GUARD HONORS GENERAL RILEY

SALEM, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Brigadier General Thomas E. Riley, commander of Oregon's infantry brigade, received word here today of his election as vice-president of the National Guard association of the United States.

The election took place at the meeting of the national organization at Norfolk, Virginia. The association consists of all officers of the National Guard in the United States. Riley is the youngest general in the United States army, his generalship appointment being confirmed by the United States senate more than a year ago.
