NURSES TRAVEL OVER COUNTY ON TIME SCHEDULE

Nurses of the Jackson County Health unit observe a consistent schedule. One day each week the nurse is in each community. Any questions or advice regarding children's health problems, baby ailments, skin disease, prenatal questions she will be glad to answer and advise. In the rural communities the nurse is very like a good Samaritan. She is everybody's friend and mothers pop out of their houses as she passes to ask about Johnnie's skin or baby's cold. She carries books for a little sick girl, a coat for a school girl, medicine for one man and material regarding disease for another. She takes reading material to persons who cannot otherwise have it and she has a word of cheer for everyone as she hurries along. The money, which finances this health education comes, in part, from the Jackson County Health association.

Baker, secretary of war during the Wilson administration, told a Democratic rally in Brooklyn last night that the Republican administration, through the Smoot-Hawley tariff, had "prostrated and practically destroyed American industry." Speaking over a nation-wide radio network the Chilon said that "a condition of economic war throughout the world has existed" ever since the bill first was discussed in the senate.
