

Grants Pass Wants Post-Season Tilt With Tigers

UNCONVINCED BY 7-6 DEFEAT AT MEDFORD HANDS

Only Mark On Cavemen's Record at Hands of Burger Squad—Local Ideas Mostly Against Movement

Grants Pass football fans, irked by the 7-6 defeat handed their favorites by the Medford high school football team, have started a movement for another game with the Burgerbombers. They suggest that it be a post-season affair. The matter has not been formally presented to the local school authorities.

There is no possibility of a post-season game with Grants Pass. In the first place, it would settle nothing. If Grants Pass won it, each team would have a victory; if Medford won, it would be an empty victory, as the Burgerbombers have already defeated the Cavemen in a game in which they gained more yardage and, with any luck, would have scored at least one more touchdown.

Fellows Also Unconvinced

In the second place, if Grants Pass was granted another chance to redeem itself, the same courtesy would have to be extended to Klamath Falls, who, despite the 21-0 trouncing administered last Saturday, entertain notions they are the better team.

In the third place, the Southern Oregon conference schedule, as far as Medford is concerned, calls for one game each with its conference rivals and its alternating would disarrange the balance of the schedule. Also Medford has a heavier schedule and, if any post-season game is played, it will be for something more important than a rebuilding of a Southern Oregon athletic squabble.

Courier Tells Situation

The Grants Pass Courier has the following to say on the subject:

"Grants Pass football fans are now turning their attention toward a movement for some post-season games this year in the Southern Oregon conference. The local gridmen have come through this year so far with only one defeat and that a one-point loss at the hands of the Medford Tigers. With a win over Medford, the locals would have been certain of a championship, after the terrific beating they gave Ashland last Saturday. Because of the loss of a championship may be by one point, fans are footing for the Medford team to meet the Cavemen in a game after the season is closed. If Grants Pass takes Klamath Falls, November 5, the request for a Tiger game will probably become a demand.

"Grants Pass and Medford only meet once in the regular conference schedule, and a good sized gate could be expected from the rivals meeting again. The one point loss would be before the Cavemen every minute of the game, and the Tigers would doubtless want to show that they could take the locals by more than an extra point missed on a conversion. The loss was more of an error on the part of the Cavemen than good playing by the Tigers, and if a game was played with a lot at stake, a return Cavemen-Tiger game certainly should be.

"Until the season is over, no plans can be formulated, but Grants Pass rooters are slowly falling in line for some post-season thrills."

GRIDIRON SPARKS

DETROIT—Oregon State's football team has a record to protect in its clash with Detroit here Thanksgiving day. The far westerners never have lost a game in Michigan. Back in 1916 they wiped up the field with a great Michigan State team and in 1929 handed Detroit its first defeat in 20 games.

CHICAGO—Big Ten members have enjoyed extraordinary success in their inter-sectional games this season. Of 10 games played against eastern, southern, Big Six and midwestern independent opposition, Big Ten members have won seven, tied two and lost one.

NEW YORK—More trouble seems to be waiting Fordham and New York university, two of the biggest disappointments of the eastern campaign. Fordham, beaten by Michigan State and Boston college, now must play St. Mary's Gelsa while N. Y. U. battles by Colgate and Purdue, faces George, which usually plays its best football in the north.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass.—Eddie Casey might have given his Harvard varsity a thorough shaking up yesterday except for the fact there wasn't much to shake. Seven regulars were so badly battered they couldn't appear for practice.

EVANSTON, Ill.—It's all very hard on the freshmen, but the scrimmages against the yearlings sometimes prove helpful to the scrubs. Northwestern's second team did better than the regulars against the Frosh yesterday and as a result Chester Sutton, fullback, and Roy Auguston, quarter, won part-time jobs on the varsity for Saturday's game with Ohio State.

CAMBRIDGE—If Harvard players were superstitious, they would have a hard time being optimistic about Saturday's game with army. The tradition, harked by years of results, is that Harvard can't beat Army at Cambridge and the Cadets can't win at West Point.

DETROIT—With the addition of a Thanksgiving Day game with Oregon State, six states and the District of Columbia are represented on the University of Detroit's schedule this year. In addition to two Michigan schools there are two Pennsylvanians, Washington and Jefferson and Villanova, Oregon, Georgetown from Washington, D. C., Holy Cross from Massachusetts, Marquette from Wisconsin, Loyola of Louisiana.

OAKLAND, Cal.—Five of the St. Mary's football players who are eastward bound for the Fordham game Saturday saw action two years ago when the Gelsa triumphed over the team. They are Captain Bill Beasley, who scored the winning touchdown, Angel Brovelli, star of the game, Emory Rubel, center, and Mike Stepanovich and Bill Carpenter, guards.

MORGANTOWN, W. Va.—Change in Georgetown's coaching system was all bad news for Earle Neale, West Virginia coach. It meant all the scouting that had been done in preparation for Saturday's game had to be cast aside and nothing would be known about what to expect from the Hill-toppers.

STANFORD HOLDS FAITH IN WARNER

SOUTHERN OREGON NORMAL SCHOOL, Ashland, Nov. 2.—(Sp.)—Amid a wild demonstration by a victory-mad crowd of rallying students, the undefeated Soma football squad, fresh from a driving 31 to 0 decision over Eastern Oregon Normal, returned here Monday. Work will begin immediately in preparation for the next game with Chico State Teachers' college of Chico, Cal.

Harvey Oakes, big first string tackle, was the only casualty of the LaGrande encounter. He hurt a leg and was limping about the campus yesterday. He will be ready to return to his old place within a few days.

At present the only other man suffering more than the usual share of bruises and stiffness is Hobson's Irish center, Con Mahoney. He returned from the east with a touch of infection on both arms. He is undergoing treatment and will be fit in short order, it is expected.

With almost two weeks to go before the important tilt with the Chico Wildcats in Ashland on Armistice day, Hobson intends to flash his full strength in the effort to repeat last year's win over the formidable invaders.

A victory over the Chico outfit ranks in importance with the successful turning back of Oregon Normal at the most desired contest to make the season's work complete. The Chico-S. O. N. S. battle will mark the 1932 debut of Hobson's great combination before a home crowd on a local field. The rambling Soms have played every one of their other four games this season away from the home grounds.

Hobson's new backfield combination, made up of Claude Hines at fullback; Pal Lancaster and Cliff McLean, halfbacks, and Al Bradford in the quarterback role, went through its initial test against collegiate competition as a single unit in great style. Behind a powerful offensive and defensive line, Hobson's revamped set of backs rode roughshod over the best defense Coach Quinn's easterners could put into the field.

With such an array of power the Soms now loom as the real threat to the Oregon Normal's supremacy in non-conference circles of the state.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 2.—(P)—Coach Prink Callison put his Oregon University Webfoots through a stiff practice today in preparation for their football game Saturday with the Orangemen of Oregon State college.

The game, a Pacific Coast conference struggle, will be played at Corvallis, a feature of Oregon State's annual home-coming. Determined to remedy their weakness against aerial attacks—a weakness that lost them their game against the Ucla Bears—the Webfoots concentrated today on building up a strong defense against passing.

The Oregon squad will invade Corvallis in good condition. Mike Mikulak, the plunging fullback, who is

also invaluable at backing up the line, will be ready to go against Oregon state, his injured knee having healed. Stan Koetka, who hurt his shoulder in the early season game with Santa Clara, will be back at half after an absence of several weeks, and Bill Morgan, captain, out three weeks with an injured hand, will also be back in the lineup as tackle.

AERIAL PASSENGER SERVICE BROADENED
