

# Harding Was Tolerant But Abused President Says Harry Daugherty

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Warren G. Harding was a tolerant, but sadly abused president, Harry M. Daugherty, attorney general in the late president's cabinet, declared in a speech here today commemorating the 67th birthday anniversary of Mr. Harding.

Daugherty, in one of his few public appearances since he retired from the cabinet, asserted "no man suffered from the so-called 'freedom of the press' as did President Harding. That the abuse came after his death is all the more shameful."

Speaking at memorial services conducted by the Columbus Kiwanis club, Daugherty said President Harding was one of the most tolerant of statesmen, who respected every man's religion, and regarded any church as better than none.

"As president of the United States, his outstanding achievement was the Washington conference on the limitations of armaments. Only a man of vision, courage and supreme faith in humanity would have undertaken that unprecedented step in international affairs."

"We do well to recall the past, for, while the magnitude and benefits of the work of the Harding administration

may have been somewhat dimmed by the frenzy of suspicion, malevolent accusations and gossip, yet time, the unfailing dispenser of justice, impartially reveals them as it swings onward.

"His successors . . . remind you that not a single policy inaugurated by President Harding has been removed or set aside. On the contrary, the most progressive measures pursued by the government today are extensions and developments of the program conceived and put in motion by the Harding administration.

"Abuse of men on high is not new or peculiar to this generation. Every man that ever occupied the presidential chair, no matter what his politics, has felt the sting of unjustified attacks.

"The right of 'free speech' and the 'freedom of the press' is sadly abused. Men's tongues wag too freely in spreading false gossip about public officials.

"No man suffered more from the so-called 'freedom of the press' than did President Harding.

"Some day an inspired historian, unbiased and honest, will write the life of Warren G. Harding. He will soon to mention the gossip and their infernal works."

## ELECTION RETURNS FOR HOLLY GOERS

## BRIGGS CONDUCTS ACTIVE CAMPAIGN; GIVES STATEMENT

Wm. M. Briggs, the Republican nominee for the office of district attorney, is very active these days in promoting his campaign. Briggs states he is confident of a splendid vote in Ashland, and expects to hold his own in Medford. Briggs says the Medford people have always stood back of him with splendid support. Many new supporters are daily actively rallying to his support, he says, and expressing a desire to work for his cause.

Briggs, in commenting on his campaign, stated as follows: "I am the regular Republican nominee for the office. I have practiced the profession of law in Jackson county for the past 13 years, during which time the records of the clerk of court will show that I have been retained in a large number of important cases, with successful results. I have been city attorney of Ashland since 1919, through several different administrations, and the fact of my continual re-appointment to that office is evidence of my ability to stand aloof from any influence, and to treat the matters coming before me fairly. I have endeavored to conduct my campaign without casting any aspersions or slanders upon any other candidate. I believe in clean politics, and if I can't have the office through a clean campaign, I do not want it at all. I have given to the people a simple statement as to my platform. That statement contains no impossible promises. It is a statement that I can stand for and abide by throughout my term of office, if elected. An independent opponent, who is a candidate, but who is not really in the race for the office, has uttered much slander, false statements, and has endeavored to spread malicious and false reports concerning me. I have paid no attention to him, as it is evident that the source is considered, and it is apparent that the utterances are those of an irresponsible demagogue. Such statements are apparent in their falsity. I am willing to stand on my record, personally and politically.

"In my platform I have pledged that I will give all citizens a square deal, regardless of position, rank, title or influence. All will be treated alike. I have pledged myself to give prompt and proper attention to all the county business, and act as the legal adviser of the county court. I stand squarely for law enforcement, without evasion or equivocation, personally and politically. I do not intend to make the district attorney's office a nuisance, but the law will be enforced.
