

Eugene High Promises Tigers Tough Grid Tussle Here Tomorrow

MUDDY FIELD MAY SLOW UP ATTACK OF BURGER CREW

Visitors Coming Fresh From 19 to 6 Triumph Over Corvallis — Strong Competition Is Expectation

Eugene high school's football squad defeated an ancient rival, Corvallis, last night, 19 to 6, on their home field, and the same squad, with all its stars in harness, will arrive here Saturday morning to play Medford high school at Van Scoyoc field. The Willamette valley team gives promise of being the strongest competition of the year for the Burgermeister. The Corvallis squad offered Eugene slight resistance.

Coach Burger will probably start the same lineup that played last Saturday at Klamath Falls last Saturday, and use many of the same formations. The coach has been busy all week knocking the confidence out of his charges. This has not been difficult, as Klamath Falls is a team that pays more attention to the newspaper clippings than to the performance of its players.

Prospects point towards a wet field for the game Saturday. This will be nothing new for the visitors, but will be the first time this season that the Burgermeister have gone into action with the ground wet. They played part of the Grange Pass game in a drizzle, and it slowed up their passing.

Stars Retain Positions. Red Scheel will start as quarterback. This had showed last Saturday he had generalship, and a steel arm for passing. Tommy White, who has been bothered by a sore hand, will also see action.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Nov. 4.—(Spl.)—An elaborate homecoming dish with the annual O. S. C. football classic the main ingredient but liberally flavored with other entertaining events, is ready to serve to upwards of 25,000 visitors and local students and townspeople expected here for this traditional celebration this week end. Heavy late ticket reservations for the game November 5 indicate that a goodly number of Mr. and Mrs. Oregon and the kids are preparing to forget bitter bickerings of a strenuous political campaign for a day and enjoy a brief pre-election respite by renewing acquaintances and participating in the main campus activities here prepared by a host of hard working student and alumni committees.

Headed by Merritt Nash of Marshfield, these homecoming workers have arranged a comprehensive round of events designed to appeal to all visitors whether or not they are graduates or ex-students of the institution. One special group for which provision has been made is the editors of the state, many of whom will gather for a no-holds-bar in the Memorial Union building Saturday noon, and later be seated in a body to view the football struggle. The executive committee of the state editorial association will hold its semi-annual meeting here in the forenoon.

HOPE FOR BEARS SEEN IN ABSENCE OF TROJAN'S STAR

Cardinals Slight Favorites to Trim Huskies — Oregon State College Classic Looms As Close Battle

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4.—(P)—As usual, the long-invincible Trojans of Southern California will be favorites when they face the University of California's Bears in Olympic stadium at Los Angeles tomorrow in hopes of taking one more step toward another Pacific Coast conference football championship.

Although the odds ran as high as 2 1/2 to 1 against them, the twice-defeated Bears have hopes of being the first to cross the Trojan goal line this season. California has appeared increasingly strong in recent games and Coach "Navy Bill" Ingram has concentrated on defense against the Trojan aerial attack, strongest point in the U. S. C. offense.

Mohler's Absence Counts. Hopes of the Ingram men for an upset hang largely on the absence of Orr Mohler, star Trojan back, permanently lost to U. S. C. because of a back injury, and the promised first appearance of the veteran "Hard Luck Hank" Schalbach, California's cannonball, against Southern California. Twice put out of Southern California games by injuries, Schalbach won't be in exactly the best of condition, what with an injured ankle, a recent touch of the flu and loss of practice

—but he's a big hope for the battered Bears. In Palo Alto the twice-beaten Cardinals of Stanford will be slight favorites to win over the University of Washington Huskies, touted as Coach Jimmie Phelan's strongest squad. The Huskies come into the game after an easy previous week-end with a revamped backfield and high hopes.

Oregon Rivals Meet. The northland's major clash will line up the old-time rivals of University of Oregon and Oregon State college at Corvallis in what looms as another close battle. The Staters showed up well in losing to U. S. C. 10 to 0, earlier in the season, while Oregon won from Santa Clara and lost by the closest of margins to U. C. L. A.

At Pullman, "Babe" Hollingbery's hard-hitting Washington State college Cougars, whose chief claim to fame this season is a 7 to 2 victory over California, will meet the light but game Vandals of University of Idaho.

The remaining two conference teams, the undefeated University of California at Los Angeles and the University of Montana, rest.

CUBS WIN, 7 TO 0, AGAINST J'VILLE (By John Snider) With Bernal Slead the most spectacular player, Jacksonville high was defeated by a 7-0 score in the football game with the Tiger Cubs at Van Scoyoc field yesterday. Playing an offensive game, Coach Kirtley's Tiger Cubs were only able to score once, when Bernal Slead made a 65-yard run in the second quarter. The Jacksonville team was about equally matched, although they only had two reserves. Bob Forbes of Jacksonville was slightly injured in the fourth quar-

ter. The second team was sent in to replace the Tiger Cubs at the beginning of the fourth quarter and finished the game.

FROSH AND ROOKS TO CLASH TONIGHT

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Oregon and Oregon State freshmen will end their "little civil war" tonight when their football squads meet at 8 o'clock on Hayward field to settle their differences. The first game ended in a scoreless tie and the teams were so evenly matched it is difficult to predict the winner.

Oregon banks its hopes on a speedy backfield and on Stew Milligan's brilliant kicking. The Webfoots will present one of the smallest guards on the coast, little Shorty Hahn, 155 pounds.

Bob Patrick, who is to call signals, may not be able to answer the opening whistle as he is still in a weakened condition from an attack of tonsillitis. 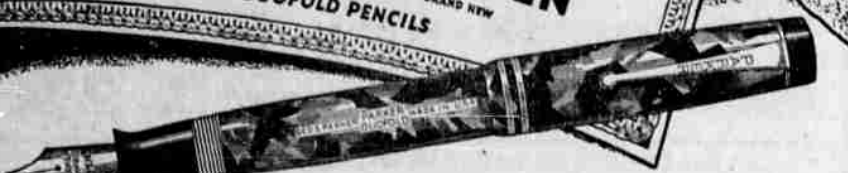
