MEDFORD SENDING LARGE DELEGATION FOR TWO-DAY MEET

Women Will Discuss Measures Held Needed to Better Homes and Schools of Nation—Delegates Listed

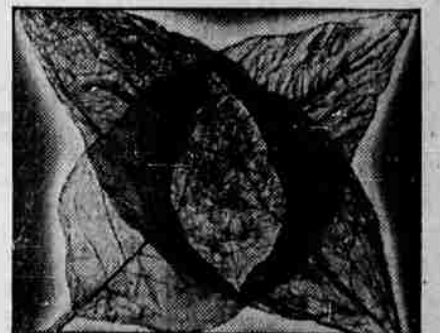

The District Attorney's office has been conducted more economically than it has been for any year since 1924, although many large cases have been handled, including two murder trials!

There will be a 15 percent reduction in the budget for this office for 1933 under what it was for 1932—added savings for taxpayers! During the preceding administration of the office of District Attorney the profit to the county from the prohibition fund was approximately \$900,000. During Mr. Coddling's term of office, the profit will be in excess of \$10,000!

It should be thoroughly understood that not one cent of the taxpayers' money goes into the prohibition fund, as it is all derived from fines paid on conviction of Prohibitionlaw Violators.

The District Attorney's office expense for the first three years of his term was \$2163.37 less than the Budget allowance...

Substantial savings this year are also being effected. In former years, thousands of dollars of County money was lost in a Bank failure. Two Bank failures in Jackson county during Mr. Coddling's term as District Attorney, involving \$125,000.00 of County funds, with absolutely no loss to the County.

All County legal business has been handled by the regular District Attorney's office force during his administration. No large Attorney's fees paid for Special Counsel as in former years.

Mr. Coddling has voluntarily accepted a salary reduction in accordance with the recommendations made by Governor Meier's committee.

Mr. Coddling is at the present time, Vice-President of the District Attorney's Association of Oregon.

Approximately 3000 criminal cases have been handled thru the District Attorney's office during his Administration with a high percentage of convictions. In addition to this the Office has handled all of the Civil business of the County and given 500 Opinions to County Officers.

Considering the number of cases handled, the District Attorney's Office of Jackson County has been operated for less than any other County in Oregon.

In all criminal cases, Mr. Coddling has attempted to so prepare and assemble the evidence that pleas of guilty have been had in a large percentage of the cases thereby saving the County the expense of Grand Jury investigations and expense of trials.
