The train stopped for a few minutes at Greensprings to take on water and Mrs. Hoover appeared as a substitute for the president, who was still at dinner.

"What are you all down so late for?" Mrs. Hoover called out to the group almost invisible in the darkness.

"Because we are for Mr. Hoover," one man replied.

"I've been for him a long time," Mrs. Hoover returned.

Speeches Helping
As the train pulled away the president hurried out to the rear platform and waved to the group. A crowd estimated by police at about 2,000 was gathered to greet the president at Cumberland, Md., and Mr. Hoover shook hands with a few of the local Republican leaders.

"We think we've got it in the sack for you," one of them said.

"Just keep up those speeches; they are coming through fine."

"Speech, speech," seem of those in the group yelled.

"I've been making too many of them lately," the chief executive replied, with a smile. The president had started to retire when the train arrived at Connellsville, Pa., late at night, but he made an appearance after he found a crowd waiting.

"It's nice of you to come down at this time of night," he told the assembled group. "We are making headway. I am confident of carrying Connellsville and the state of Pennsylvania complete."

"Where's the Mrs.?" somebody called.

"I'm afraid she's gone to bed," the president laughingly said.

might happen by way of social disturbance if he, as the representative of the liberal party, might be elected.

He added: "But the president and his supporters have not hesitated to predict what would happen to securities and business if he were not elected."

Mr. Roosevelt, in a ringing voice that belied the rigors of the four months campaign he has conducted in 37 states, declared:

"He (President Hoover) would have us sit like Micawber and wait for something to turn up. He hints that
