

FITTS DECLARES LIES BEING USED AGAINST HOOVER

Address at G. O. P. Rally Here Lists President's Acts in Saving Country—Tariff Necessity Stressed

Stamping as "downright lies" much of the propaganda against President Hoover, which the Democratic candidate and his workers have been broadcasting to the American people, Burton Pitts, Los Angeles district attorney, and war veteran Friday night told a crowd of over 500 at the Natatorium, why he intends to vote for Hoover again this term. His appearance here was under the sponsorship of the Veterans' Republican club.

Numerous instances of Hoover's actions which have saved the United States from catastrophes were cited by Mr. Pitts, who told how Hoover was successful in keeping the country on a gold standard after he had been informed by Secretary of the Treasury Ogden Mills that the United States had only two weeks to remain on the standard. Mr. Pitts was in the White House with the two men when the announcement was made.

Tariff Need Stressed

Hoover's reconstruction program was also pointed to by the district attorney, and told how this had aided the nation.

Speaking of the tariff and the effect its removal would have on indus-

tries along the Pacific coast, Mr. Pitts said:

"I cannot understand how any citizen living in California, Oregon or Washington could do other than vote the Republican ticket, and thereby, Herbert Hoover. The Democratic principles of competitive and reciprocal tariff would mean economic suicide for the Pacific coast.

"If Mr. Roosevelt should attempt to carry out his theory of competitive tariff, our farmers, cattlemen and fruit growers would be face to face with the alternative of either lowering wages, costs of production and our living standards down to the wage level and wage standard of Mexico, South America and other countries, or operate at a cost equal to the difference between the wage level and living conditions of the countries involved.

"It is economically impossible for the cattlemen of Oregon to compete with the cattlemen of Mexico.

Lumber Cannot Compete

"The lumber industry of Oregon and Washington cannot compete with the lumber industry of Canada with cooie labor. It is totally impossible for the orange and lemon growers of California to compete with Italy and citrus growers of other countries without jeopardizing our methods of living and the wage scale that has made possible our standard of living in the past."

He went on to say: "I have heard during the course of the campaign of the indifference of the Republican party to the welfare of War veterans. I have been active in Veterans' affairs since the war, have been a past commander of the Legion in California and was one of the authors of the first Sweet bill passed in congress which raised compensation for the totally disabled from \$30 to \$100 per month.

Kind to Veterans

"We found it utterly impossible to get any veterans' relief legislation by a Democratic congress under Woodrow Wilson, and it was necessary to wait until the Republican party got

control of congress to secure relief. Every piece of remedial relief legislation for the benefit of Civil war veterans, Spanish War veterans and World War veterans has been passed by a Republican congress and administration."

"I believe Tammany hall to be the most corrupt organization that America has ever known. It has made justice in New York a mockery. It has prostituted the right of every American citizen to decent government. I can't believe that our Western people have forgotten that nation-wide scandal of a year or so ago when judgeships in New York were openly bartered over the counters of Woodrow Wilson and Grover Cleveland (Democrats) that they fought Tammany with their entire strength.

"We find that however, today, Tammany has in its convention endorsed the national Democratic ticket. I know from past experience that Tammany endorsements are selfish and are not predicated upon the desire for the general welfare of the community or nation.

Slap at Tammany

"I find it hard to believe that our citizens want Tammany to appoint our federal judges, and other positions of trust and confidence in our national government. I should never vote for any person, Democrat or Republican, endorsed by Tammany, certainly not if the campaign of the person was under the leadership of Tammany.

"No man in recent American history has served as President who possessed a more human understanding, or a heart more responsive to the sufferings or unhappiness of our people than Herbert Hoover. His entire life and public record is surely corroborative of this statement. I shall never apologize for my support of Mr. Hoover. I find it a privilege to do whatever I can on behalf of that man who has done more, who has contributed more, to our welfare, and, who has received for doing so, more criticism and abuse than any man in Amer-

ican history since Abraham Lincoln.

"As a Republican I shall vote for Mr. Hoover, and conscientiously feel that every other Republican who has the welfare of our country at heart should hesitate a long time before voting against him."

Cowgill Presides

Last night's meeting was presided over by Ralph W. Cowgill of the Veterans' Republican club, who spoke briefly on the Republican campaign for president, during which he named the Democratic leaders and the amount of money they had received as refunds from federal income tax, as well as the sums they turned over to the Democratic campaign fund.

Republican candidates introduced during the evening were Everett Beeson, sheriff candidate; Wm. Briggs, district attorney candidate; and Frank Peil, candidate for coroner.

Mr. Pitts left by plane Saturday morning for Los Angeles, where he was called by a death in the family. Monday he is scheduled to speak over the national hook-up in behalf of President Hoover, and Tuesday evening he will be a guest at dinner of President and Mrs. Hoover at their Palo Alto home.

Wm. Briggs, regular Republican nominee for district attorney, spoke for ten minutes stating he stands squarely on his platform announced months ago of strict law enforcement personally and politically, for economy in the conduct of the office furnishing his own car and paying for its upkeep and gas; for a square deal to everyone regardless of position, title or rank, to have one deputy only at such times as needed and to attend to the legal business of the county offices with promptness and closed by saying he feels he should have the support of party members and would appreciate the same.

BUSINESS BEARS IGNORANCE TOLL LIBRARIANS TOLD

Librarians of southern Oregon held on Thursday and Friday at Klamath Falls their annual conference with the state librarian, Miss Harriet C. Long.

Discussions were given over to technical problems and important current books. Following the Thursday evening banquet Miss Long addressed the gathering on the work of the state library in the wide reaches of the state, in which there are no county libraries, 27 counties in all.

An outstanding feature of the conference was the closing address by R. C. Groesbeck, president of the chamber of commerce and member of the Klamath county library board.

As a successful and experienced business man, he indicated the importance of libraries to the continued growth and efficiency of business. His argument was outlined as follows:

"Libraries are essential to the stability of government—which is the very foundation of business; that stability of government is impossible without clear thinking on the part of individuals and clear thinking depends on the furnishing of the minds of individuals with accurate and complete information upon which to reflect.

"Business bears the burden of all social activity, the burdens of illiteracy, of crime, of sickness and unemployment; that in the illiteracy of 1,000,000 persons in the United States a vast amount of man power is lost to the business world through guile and ignorance that can only

be lightened by ever freer access to educational material; that crime has caused confinement of 2,600,000 persons, representing loss of wages that might be averaged at \$1500 per year and therefore causing loss of a great purchasing power in the business world — crime being in large part preventable by the better information, broader outlook and increased opportunity provided in wide circulation of books.

"That the sickness of 1,500,000 persons witnesses a great lack of the wisdom of body that is so necessary to efficiency and that is so easily obtainable through the printed word.

"That in the problem of unemployment, at least lack of thrift, lack of foresight, lack of preparation can be in large part overcome by careful and well directed reading, for libraries are the greatest instruments of all for the adjustment of individual lives, and for sane relations in social life."

The conference was made particularly enjoyable by the beauty of the Klamath public library building and by the courtesy and thoughtfulness of the hostesses, Miss Enola Hawkins of the city library and Miss Margaret Nye of the Klamath county library, according to Medford's delegation.
