GEBAUER ELECTED KIWANIS PREXY AT LUNCHEON SESSION

Ted Gebauer was elected president of the Kiwanis club at the luncheon today noon at the Hotel Medford. He will succeed Olen Arnsperger, immediate past president. Other officers named by the casting of an unanimous ballot were: Max Peirce, vice-president; George Frey, treasurer; Carl V. Tengvall, secretary, and the following as directors: C. S. Butterfield, J. C. Mann, C. C. Lemmon, J. C. Thompson, E. A. Faber, W. J. Warner and Everett Trowbridge.

T. Morris Dunn, speaker for the day, was unable to appear so his speech, which was forwarded, was read by President Arnsperger, and listed reasons why the Grange power bill should be defeated, placing special emphasis upon the claims that it authorizes \$65,500,000 of state bonds in addition to the present "huge state debt."

The bill, it was further claimed, would bankrupt Oregon, when all resources should be "used to feed the thousands of unemployed."

This added bonded indebtedness would raise taxes still higher, and more home and farm owners would lose property and life's savings through tax delinquency."

A letter from W. S. U'Ren was also read by President Arnsperger, and expressed the same sentiment. The program today was arranged to complete the plan of the Kiwanis club to hear the affirmative and negative arguments on all measures to be voted on tomorrow.

Professor C. F. Davies of the Eagle Point schools presented the affirmative arguments last week.

Reports on last Saturday's football game at Corvallis were given by Ted Gebauer, E. C. Solinsky and Tommy Williams.

All Kiwanians were urged by President Arnsperger to "get out and vote tomorrow."
