According to G. W. Maier, a member of the Highway Protective association, who is a visitor in Medford today, the attack on the freight truck and bus bill will result undoubtedly in some of the Medford citizens voting under a misapprehension of the legislation that will bring the people of Oregon long needed relief.

"This bill," he said, "will not legislate freight trucks off the highways, but will require the truck operator to handle a reasonable load, 17 tons, without jeopardy to the lives of others. The bill, he said, will relieve the Oregon taxpayer and will probably result in an immediate lowering of auto license fees as well as reduction of highway expenses lifting the burden of the already overburdened taxpayer and placing on the industry that will profit most, its equal share of taxation."

Mr. Maier feels that "a majority of the citizens of Oregon have familiarized themselves with the bill, and he proposes to do and despite the derogatory statements made by truck operators will, on November 8, vote 314 X Yes."

Question of voting for a bill will be brought up at the meeting. The motion will be to be held by the Daley hall which has been rented for this purpose several years. All members interested in a future Grange hall should be present to voice their opinions.
