FEHL, SCHERMERHORN LEADING

G. O. P. NOMINEE 1009 AHEAD IN JUDGESHIP RACE

Earl Fehl Carries Ashland and Country Precincts — Schermerhorn Leading Jennings for Sheriff Chair

Earl H. Fehl at 2 o'clock this afternoon had a lead of 1009 votes over C. E. (Pop) Gates, on the face of complete returns from nine Medford precincts, Ashland complete, and 27 country precincts.

Fehl carried Ashland and the country precincts, and ran Gates a close race in most of the Medford precincts.

BOURBON TYPHOON SWEEPS RANKS OF REPUBLICANS

America's voters conferred on Franklin D. Roosevelt so tremendous a victory that it not only gave the Democratic party unshakable control of congress, but very nearly cleared the states of Republican governors.

The Republican casualty list in congress was terrific. Smoot, Watson, Moses, Bingham, Jones—names to conjure with in the senate—all were defeated. These men were the heart of the party's "old guard." The house toll was but a repetition.

DAY AND KELLY MAINTAIN LEAD

E. B. Day of Sams Valley and E. C. Kelly of this city were leading in the race for the legislature. Kelly's strength in this city and the north county precincts was one of the surprises of the election. He polled strong in both city and country.

SQUATTERS GIVEN 5-YEAR PAROLE

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 9.—(AP)—Judge Alger Fie this afternoon sentenced Emory Davis and E. H. Best to two years in the state penitentiary and then paroled them for five years. They were convicted of violation of the federal trespass act in taking up claims in the Fish Creek district of the Umpqua national forest.

Hoover Neighbors Prove Loyalty In Hour of Defeat

PALO ALTO, Cal., Nov. 9.—(AP)—This town, which claims President Hoover as its most illustrious citizen, showed him today it was 100 per cent proud of him, even in defeat.

When the President arrived yesterday the usual display of photographs and bunting gave the town the normal pre-election appearance. But today, as if by magic, every store window and business building blossomed forth gay decorations and draped photographs honoring the President and acknowledging his visit.

OREGON RETAINS G. O. P. SENATORS DESPITE REVOLT

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 9.—(AP)—Although Oregon was swept headlong and with unprecedented directness to the democratic side of the electoral college, the Beaver state will be the only western commonwealth to be represented by two republican senators.

Senator Frederick Steiwer, republican incumbent, piled up a great lead over his democratic opponent, Walter B. Gleason, and his election was conceded last night. Senator Charles L. McNary, Steiwer's colleague, co-author of the McNary-Haugen bill, yet has four years to serve.

4 COAST STATES DROP PROHIBITION IN TUESDAY VOTE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Unless there is an upset in results between now and the final canvassing of the votes, Arizona, California, Washington and Oregon will be without state prohibition laws in a few weeks.

The deluge of votes favoring repeal of the California dry law led Governor Ralph today to announce he would ask legal advice as to the status of some 300 state prison convicts, serving terms for violation of that statute. It was understood the governor's query included the question of "amnesty."

Repeal of the California anti-liquor law will leave the state without enforcement measures, state officials said, adding that the repealer would become effective five days after official certification of the vote, which probably will be about December 17.

Victory for repealers in Oregon would leave the state without enforcement machinery for a "bone dry" constitutional amendment prohibiting manufacture, sale and importation of liquor for beverage purposes. State officials said a repealer would become effective immediately upon canvass of the votes, not later than December 8.

PLAN LAUNCHED FOR IMPROVING EAST MAIN ST.

East Side Improvement League Formed to Start Post-Election Get-Together Drive for Better Medford

The first gun in a campaign to forget politics and internal dissension and get together in this community on a constructive march forward, was fired at noon today when, at an open meeting the East Side Improvement league was formed.

It is the plan of this league to widen East Main from the S. P. tracks to the Bear Creek bridge, put in new street lighting, cover the abandoned street car tracks, and get every property owner to modernize and improve the store fronts he owns.

ROOSEVELT FIFTH NEW YORKER FOR WHITE HOUSE JOB

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—(AP) Franklin D. Roosevelt will be the fifth man to go to the White House from New York state and the fourth governor of New York to become president of the United States.

Martin Van Buren was the first president from New York. He was inaugurated in 1837 after having first served as governor.

COODING LEADING BRIGGS IN RACE FOR PROSECUTOR

District Attorney George A. Coddie, on the face of returns from Ashland and Medford, and many of the country districts, was leading William Briggs of Ashland, by 250 or so votes.

WILSON APPEARS RE-ELECTED AS MEDFORD MAYOR

With eight Medford precincts complete, and five still out, owing to a heavy vote, and a slow count, Mayor E. M. Wilson had a substantial lead over Dr. J. M. Keene.

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ROOSEVELT WINS LANDSLIDE VOTE IN DEMO SWEEP

Tip of New England and 3 Other Eastern States Only Hoover Spots—GOP Victims in All Areas

The topmost tip of New England and three other eastern states still marked the only Hoover spots on the election map as tabulations progressed toward completion.

Returns on Tuesday's balloting showed the Roosevelt and Garner walk-away brought them not only leads in 42 states and control of the new congress, but sent several Republican governors, many members of senate and house and numerous other G. O. P. office holders looking for jobs. Overturns of Democrats were scarce.

WASHINGTON HAS DEMO LANDSLIDE; REPEAL DRY LAW

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 9.—(AP)—The Democratic landslide in Washington increased in volume today as more returns from Tuesday's general election were tabulated. Not since 1896, when the Democrats, with the aid of Populists and Silver Republicans, carried the state for William Jennings Bryan and swept the state offices, has there been such a Democratic triumph in Washington.
